LITTLE ICE BETWEEN HERE AND GAGETOWN

Reports from different places along the St. John river are to the effect that there is little ice between here and Gagetown. The river steamers are preparing for their season's work. The ice in the river opposite the city to all appearances remains as solid as ever. Teams continue to pass, and the night hinders much waste. Today however is quite warm, and a few days of warm weather will quickly melt the ice. The Nashwaak, which always runs out two or three days before the main river, is yet solid. Word from up river is to the effect that though the St. John shows no sign of breaking up the tributaries, especially the Kennebec, above the city nine miles, are rapidly weakening. From here to Gagetown the ice is reported good, but below that point there is open water for most of the way down.
