### SEVERAL KILLED IN AN EXPLOSION

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Mar. 20.—Five men were killed and a score were injured in an explosion at the Sunnyside Coal Mines here today.

The explosion was caused by a windy shot due to an overcharge of powder said to have been placed by John Pettit. Pettit is buried over his entire body and will die. The dead were all killed by sulphuric fumes which followed the shot. The mine was swept as if by a whirlwind.

Twenty-nine men were in the west shaft of the mine when the explosion occurred within an hour after the explosion the first rescuers were almost suffocated on going into the mine. The dead, injured and suffering miners were found prostrate over all portions of the west shaft. Many recovered sufficiently to crawl to the shaft unaided. The men in the north shaft who were not seriously affected by the explosion were the most active in the work of rescue.

As the news of the disaster spread, a large crowd gathered in which were scores of persons who had relatives in the mine.


