GOVERNMENT TO TEST PEAT FOR FUEL NOW

Special To The Standard. Ottawa, Aug. 10.—The Government has begun the erection of an experimental station for peat. This station is situated on the southern outskirts of the city, and the first experiments will be with peat blocks made at Alfred, Ont., where there is an excellent peat bog.

The experimental station, which is under the care of Dr. Haanel, Dominion Superintendent of Mines, and is fashioned upon the principle of those in Norway and Sweden, and will provide tests for the application of peat as a fuel.

Supply Unlimited.

Exports state that the supply of coal in Canada for fuel may be measured, while the supply of peat is possibly unlimited. Therefore immediate experiments with the latter are calculated to place the Dominion in possession of a lasting and citizen-sufficient fuel. Dr. Haanel is exceedingly optimistic as to the result of the experiments, which have proved of immense value in Scandinavia.

NOVA SCOTIA LUMBERMAN PASSES AWAY

Special To The Standard. Parrboro, N. S., Aug. 10.—Joseph Girvan Elderkin, of the firm of H. Elderkin and Co., Port Greville, died at his home at seven o'clock this evening of heart failure.

The deceased was taken ill last evening when out in his motor boat and gradually grew worse until the end came. Mr. Elderkin was a very enterprising man and his firm has done a large business in ship building and lumbering. He was about 45 years of age and leaves a widow and several small children. His only surviving brother is Robert Elderkin, of Truro. Mrs. Cranwick Jost, of Bridgetown is a sister. Mr. Elderkin was a worthy and useful citizen and will be greatly missed and regretted.

MAY DIE AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT

He was disconnecting the planer, lost his balance and fell on the iron work below, while a cross-block fell on his head. At the home of Rev. D. MYSTERIOUS AEROPLANE IS READY TO FLY

Toronto, Aug. 11.—A successful flight was made last night by the aeroplane which has been constructed and quartered at the house of F. B. Fetherstonhaugh on Lake Shore Road, Mimico. Great secrecy has been preserved in regard to this aeroplane, which has been in process of construction for a long while. The owner and inventor of the machine is said to be a mathematical master in one of the local schools, but his identity has not as yet been revealed. The aeroplane, which was watched with great interest by many in the vicinity, rose to a height of one hundred feet or so, and remained in the air for considerable time, appearing to be under perfect control.

HOME TOWN TO WELCOME MME. NORDICA

Farmington, Me., Aug. 11.—Great preparations are being made in this village for the arrival of Mme. Lillian Nordica, now Mrs. George V. Young, wife of the millionaire president of the Windsor Trust Company of New York City, who will come here on her honeymoon trip.

In a little house located on a farm a short distance from this town, Mme. Nordica was born, and there she spent her early childhood.

It has been many years since she visited the scene of her nativity, but now her sister, Mrs. John Norton Baldwin of Columbia road, Dorchester, and lone Norton Walker of New York City state that the great prima donna will spend a part, at least, of her honeymoon trip among the hills of Franklin county, and in the house where she was born.

The news that Mme. Nordica will probably give a free concert for the benefit of the citizens of her home town has created a breeze of excitement, and preparations are already under way to fit up a great stage on the lawn of the old Norton home, where the concert will be held.

Mmes. Baldwin and Walker have been here through the summer making the house ready for the occupancy of Mme. Nordica when she arrives. All the details have been worked out carefully, and the result is that the place looks better than at any time in its history.

42 AIRSHIPS ENTERED IN RHEIMS MEET

New York, Aug. 11.—Forty-two aeroplanes, the largest number ever brought together for a series of contests, have been entered in the events at Rheims, France, during the week of August 25, according to special despatches to the Herald.

The pilots entered for the races include every prominent aviator in France, together with a few new comers, a small number of foreign representatives. Among the different types of machines represented are the Wright, Voisin, Bleriot, Antoinette, the Herring-Curtiss and the R. E. P., all of which already have given ample proof of their ability to fly.

There being no limit to the number of aeroplanes which may be entered for the races organized by the Rheims committee, several makers have put in more than one machine. The Wright interests are represented by seven aeroplanes, the Bleriot by five, the Voisin by seven and the Antoinette by three.
