Ottawa, Jan. 16.—It is expected that one of the earliest government measures to come before parliament will, deal with the question of civil service reform. The Minister of Finance, who has had the matter under consideration since the publication of Sir Geo. Murray's report, has already carried into effect an important change in the manner of the preparation of the estimates. The principle of treasury control has governed the change made in this respect, as the result that the estimates have been thoroughly digested and are in such shape that the minister will be able to lay them before the house much sconer than has been the rule in past sessions.

Certain other changes in the method of administrative routine and affecting the great body of civil servants are considered desirable by the gover, ment, but cannot be brought about without legislation. The coming bill will provide for these changes.
