SCREAMING CHAPLIN COMEDY AT UNIQUE

Another fine bill of Pictures presented at the popular House.

ON THE NIGHT STAGE SHOWN AT THE LYRIC

A remarkable production in Pictures—Excellent Vaudeville also shown.

The excellent master picture, "On the Night Stage," as presented at the Lyric Theatre to crowded houses yesterday had no trouble whatever in living up to its flattering advance notices, and in fact it is not saying too much when one makes the assertion that this splendid portrayal of a rather remarkable story, marks an epoch in the art of picture producing.

Miss Rhea Mitchell is most charming in the part of the dance hall girl, and gives excellent support to the above mentioned artists.
