Harvey, Jan. 24.—Mrs. Arlie Steeves of Shenstone, Ontario, is visiting her parents here.


Mr. Edward Brewster was called home from St. John on Thursday last by the death of his infant daughter. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon, Jan. 23.

INTERESTING COMPLAINT  
FROM MILLTOWN, N. B.

Milltown, N. B., Jan. 23rd.

To the Editor of The Standard,  
Sir,—I was amused and somewhat chagrined at the generous sample of good, old-fashioned "gall" exhibited by your correspondent at St. Stephen last week in reporting the capture of the German prisoners who escaped from the internment camp at Amherst, N. S.

With open frankness and commendable modesty he gave full credit for the capture to the immigration officers at St. Stephen, evidently forgetting that such a place as Milltown, (where the capture really was effected), existed. I am aware that the facts are credited to the proper officer and place in the reports which are on file at the department at Ottawa, but I feel that if any credit for the act is forthcoming from the reading public, it should be given to the officer who made the capture, at least, should be mentioned in connection with it. Officer W. H. Smith of Milltown, N. B., made the arrest at Milltown, at least, the hour before the fact was received from Amherst. Halifax or any other place that the men had made their escape, and, according to the statement of the prisoners themselves, they had met on their journey from Amherst to this place numerous immigration and police officers as well as soldiers, the last one, an immigration officer, being on King street, St. Stephen, where they also purchased a lunch from a lunch counter.

With reference to the attempted break from gaol, which, in The Standard of Saturday, Marshall Olson "genuinely" admitted occurred at Milltown, I have only to say that if the prisoners are kept in confinement at Amherst as long as they would have been in the gaol at Milltown before they escaped, enough of the opening which they started to make, the war will be over, and they may be allowed to depart in peace. I trust, Sir, that you will see fit to publish the above in giving credit where credit is due.

Loggieville, N. B., Jan. 24.—The fishermen report small success. The encouraging feature of the fishing business this year is the price. Excellent prices have been paid.

The present pastor's ministry began here in April, 1915, and although he has already endeavored himself to the members of his congregation. During the absence of the pastor on his holidays, services were taken to repair the man's work was done at a cost of about \$500.00. At the same time the young ladies of the Swastika Club furnished the vestry, and when the pastor returned, accompanied by his wife, he found a decided improvement in both manse and church.

The Sunday school of Knox church has a membership of 142. The teacher, Mr. W. S. Bakirk, has been in charge of the branch of the work for a period of thirty years. He has given himself unreservedly to the task. The teachers are: Mrs. McLean, Miss Katie McMurray, Miss Florence Harris, Miss Zea Walls, Tom Wiseman, Ira McDougall, Miss Robertson, Mr. Bakirk, Rev. W. H. Loochborough.

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## WILL BE A COMPROMISE.

From present indications the decision of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes in regard to the playing of summer baseball by college students will be in the nature of a compromise, if the plans of the executive committee are accepted. The college players will be permitted to play summer baseball on or against teams comprising professional provided they first obtain permission of their college authorities, but they cannot receive remuneration for their efforts without forfeiting their amateur standing.

Such a rule will take care of cases of ignorance of college players that they were engaged with professionals but it does not accept the real source of contention—that college students should be allowed to accept money for their services. In our Maine colleges the playing of summer ball and the acceptance of remuneration for same is not forbidden except under certain conditions. It is recognized that baseball playing is a legitimate method for the students to earn money during the long vacation and this view seems to be an eminently correct one.

Extracts from the "Saint John City Assessment Act, 1908."

"Sec. 32. The Assessors shall ascertain, as nearly as possible, the particulars of the real estate, the personal property, and the income of any person, who has not brought in a statement in accordance with their notice and as required by this law, and shall make an estimate thereof at the true value and amount, to the best of their information and belief; and such estimate shall be conclusive upon all persons who have not filed their statements in due time, unless they can show a reasonable excuse for the omission."

"Sec. 43. No person shall have an abatement unless he has filed with the Assessors the statement under oath, within the time required; nor shall the Common Council, in any such case, sustain an appeal from the judgment of the Assessors, unless they shall be satisfied that there was good cause why the statement was not filed in due time as herein provided."
