

OVER THE PROVINCES.

A SUMMARY OF EVENTS AT HOME AND ABROAD.

What is going on Among Ourselves—The Daily Doings of Our Neighbors Talked About—People you know or of Whom have heard.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special).—The body of *John Joly*, the priest whose disappearance caused a sensation, has been found in the lake of Two Mountains.

Toronto, April 28.—(Special).—*Asa W. J. Archer*, an old man paralyzed on one side, was lighting his pipe on Saturday night, when he was killed.

Toronto, April 28.—(Special).—*John Joseph Althaus*, a Jeweler from Salem, N. Y., and formerly of Revelstoke, while visiting his father here, fell from an upper story window of the house yesterday and was killed.

Yarmouth, April 28.—(Special).—Sad news was received today of the death at Colorado Springs of Miss May Lewis, daughter of Henry Lewis. The young lady was in her 24th year. Consumption was the cause of death.

Cambridgeport, April 28.—(Special).—W. E. Stetson, general manager of the Bank of New Brunswick, is here in connection with the opening of an agency of the bank. The many friends he made while local manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, are giving him a warm welcome.

Victoria, B. C., April 28.—H. M. S. Condit, whose arrival has been expected for two weeks past, reached yesterday night. It is expected that he is yellow fever aboard, but as he has not yet communicated with shore the report cannot be verified.

Annapolis, April 27.—Fire yesterday afternoon totally consumed the two-story dwelling house owned and occupied by Mr. William Rice at Upper Clements, a few miles from here. The flames spread rapidly and very few of the furniture was saved. The origin of the fire is unknown. There was no insurance.

St. John's, Nfld., April 28.—The sealing steamer *Kita*, for whose safety some fear had been felt, reached port today with 30,000 seals, almost a full load. She lost 1,400 when frozen between floes, which number were made up of a complete cargo. During the early part of the season she steamed through immense herds of seals, but the ice was too broken to allow the crew to hunt them. She was snipped by floes near the shore finally, and her coal being exhausted, she was obliged to depend upon her sails to reach port.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special).—The ten-thousand new cars for the city council, which they are looking upon as being entirely too low. On the million and a half there is a great deal of loss. The city would realize only \$1,400,000, or \$70,000 short of the amount necessary to consolidate the loans to be retired on the basis of tenders submitted.

Toronto, N. S., April 28.—(Special).—The commission appointed some weeks ago to investigate the claim of the coal miners of the Dominion Coal Company for higher wages, held their final meeting here last night. While nothing was given to the public, it is generally understood that the decision reached is not favorable to the miners, and that the commission will recommend that no increase in wages be given by the company.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special).—Officers who have been attending the provincial school of infantry are deeply incensed over the announcement made last night to the effect that Major General O'Grady, who held their final meeting here last night, will be permitted to qualify for the rank of captain this season.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special).—A class of 40 to 50 officers only five or six will be able to add another star to their shoulder straps until they have taken a course at St. John's.

Montreal, April 28.—(Special).—Walter Morhead, of London, England, chairman of the Eastern Canadian Mining Company, who has been in the city for some time, is reported to have been procuring within the past few days to start the company's dredges at Wabigoon, Ontario. It is the intention to start operations at once on Wabigoon, where the company will concentrate its efforts. Mr. Morhead says \$1,000,000 is in sight. The dredges will be of the value of pooled certificates will receive fully paid up shares in the company without further assessment. This will be good news to a large number of maritime province people holding pooled certificates.

Annapolis, April 28.—(Special).—The death of Mrs. McCreary occurred here very suddenly this afternoon. She was around as usual during the day attending to her household duties when she fell to the floor and was injured. Deceased was about 70 years of age, sister of John McCreary. Four sons survive, Edward, town councillor of Annapolis, one a conductor on the I. C. B. at Truro, and two sons in the United States and four daughters, Mrs. D. Muir, of Middleton; Mrs. N. Vroom, of Boston, one in New York and one at home, survive her.

News was received here this morning of the death today of the young son of Robert Gardner of Boston, and grandson of Joseph Edwards of Annapolis.

Hopewell Hill, April 28.—The rather unusual sight of a large wild sporting and sporting in Sheepdyke Bay, closely pursued by well-manned sail boats, provided interest for the residents to place yesterday, but as the moment succeeded in making its escape, this very vivid imitation of a South Sea whaling scene was unappreciated, without material results. The animal was visited earlier in the day, when high and dry on the middle-ground, and a delegation of villagers, who, notwithstanding desperate efforts, did not succeed in giving him his quies before the flooding tide came to his rescue. This 60 feet in length, and drew about 10 feet of water, carried as the result of the tide to our peaceful shores, about 1000 lbs. and a ten-foot ash fish in his spacious anatomy.

HALIFAX LEGAL MIX.

Civil and Military Courts May Clash.

Halifax, April 28.—(Special).—The court martial at Wellington barracks in the case of Sergeant McPhee was finished yesterday. The accused was found guilty of stealing and sentenced to 188 days in the ranks. McPhee had been arraigned on two charges—stealing and receiving stolen property. This was one of the cases arising out of alleged abstraction of articles from kits of members of the Strathcona Horse, which kits had been stored to the Queen's wharf for a short time.

During the court martial, McPhee had been represented by counsel, and yesterday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, his solicitor applied to Justice Townsend for a writ of habeas corpus in the Supreme Court, and certiorari to have the papers in the matter brought into court, the writ being returnable tomorrow morning.

The solicitor went to the barracks to serve a writ on Col. White, to whom it was directed, but says he could get no satisfaction, and on going to notify the sergeant of the guard that he had the writ, he was ordered out of the barracks. Then he attempted to serve Col. Wadmore, by leaving the writ at his quarters, but said the writ was torn up.

Last night, the solicitor made another application to Justice Townsend, and was granted a duplicate writ of habeas corpus, which was served by the sheriff, and McPhee is now held here by the Supreme Court. This is thought to be the first time in which a writ of habeas corpus was issued here over a court martial.

McPhee's solicitor promises that contempt proceedings will be taken against Col. Wadmore.

Doherty, traveller for Mrs. Baird & Peters, of this city.

Sydney, April 28.—(Special).—A horrible accident occurred on the Sydney and Lunenburg track, near the coke ovens, this morning. Michael McDugan, of Broad Cove, C. B., in his hurry to escape an approaching engine, stepped to another track, only to encounter a heavy train, which struck him at a fast rate of speed. McDugan was crushed beneath the cars and killed instantly. The body when extracted was almost unrecognizable. McDugan was on his way to work at the steel works.

Ottawa, April 28.—(Special).—The following circular has been issued: "Drawing to the prevalence of smallpox in the United States, customs officers are specially directed to make particular inquiries as to the possible presence of this disease on persons arriving in Canada by vessels from the United States. Upon detection or well grounded suspicion of smallpox, the collector may call in his medical officers for a medical inspection, as provided by quarantine regulations."

Woodstock, Ont., April 27.—George Wagner had a desperate battle with a monster yesterday. Wagner, in order to clear the animal's cage, laid Jacko out to take a little exercise in the room. The monkey was in a very tame of mind, and caught Wagner's trousers with his claws, and then Wagner carelessly pushed him away, the monkey sprang and fastened his teeth in the man's leg. The fight began. The monkey was as quick as lightning. Wagner tried to seize the maddened creature by the throat, but Jacko got in two telling bites, one in the palm of the hand, the other almost severing the index finger of the same hand. Wagner nearly fainted, when his cries were heard and a man ran to his assistance with an axe. Wagner is badly injured and may die. Monkey will be poisoned.

Amherst, April 27.—The remains of the late Charles Smith, formerly of Minidie, passed through Amherst for burial at Minidie this week, accompanied by his wife and eldest daughter, Esther. Mr. Smith, who was a sergeant in the English army, came from England many years ago and took charge of the farm of the late Rufus Seaman, at Minidie. About five years ago he went to Boston as conductor on the electric cars. About four weeks ago he underwent a surgical operation. It was successful, but, owing to the general condition of his health, he did not rally. Mr. Smith was twice married, his first wife coming from England with him. His second, who survives him, was a native of Wentworth, this county. He leaves eight children by his first wife and one by his second wife.

Amherst, April 28.—The death occurred last evening at his home, The Highlands, at Robt. Bell, after only a few weeks' illness of paralysis. Mr. Bell was a native of the North End, St. John, and has been in the employ of Messrs. Christie, Ross & Co. for 25 years, being foreman of the furniture department. He was a prominent member and active worker in the Baptist church, also a member of the Foresters and Odd Fellows, and captain of No. 3 Company of the Amherst fire department. He was twice married. His first wife was Mary, eldest daughter of Mrs. William Mitchell, Amherst, who died in 1881. In 1889 he married Miss Clara Atkinson, of Deerfield, N. B., who survives him. He leaves four children: William, in Boston's steam laundry; May, Harry and Robert at home. He has one brother at home and two sisters in St. John. Mrs. James Brown, of the North End, and Mrs. J. S. Brown, of Duke street, his second son, Aubrey, aged 16, died only a few weeks ago. He was in his 48th year. Mr. Bell was of a kindly, quiet disposition, highly esteemed by all who knew him, especially by his employers and fellow workers. The funeral will take place on Sunday afternoon at the Highland cemetery.

PULP AND PAPER MILL.

Meeting of the Inglewood Company Yesterday Afternoon.

The Inglewood Pulp and Paper Company, which recently purchased the Knight property at Musquash, met yesterday afternoon and elected the following provisional directors: Duncan Stetson, George McAvity, G. Mullins, of Bangor, B. F. Pearson, of Halifax, and Chas. Burdill, of Weymouth, N. S.

The company will now proceed to take over the property under their act of incorporation. Messrs. Knight will see the lumber which they cut this winter, which will probably occupy them until the fall, after which the Inglewood Company will take possession and erect a sulphite pulp mill and a paper mill.

Besides employing the pulp made at Musquash in the paper mill, pulp will be brought from the Sissiboo pulp mills, Weymouth, N. S., for the manufacture of the finished material.

UNITED STATES AND CUBA.

Intervention and Sugar the Main Points at Issue.

Washington, April 28.—It is perfectly clear now that the main points at issue under discussion between the Cuban delegation and the secretary of war are intervention, and sugar.

The delegates have been agreed that intervention provided for in the Platt amendment will be construed by this government in the broadest manner possible, and that it is not contemplated that intervention or any other provision in the Platt amendment shall be used to the detriment of Cuba.

The sugar problem is uppermost in the minds of most of the members of the delegation, and the earnest manner in which General Wood has been advocating liberal terms toward Cuba in the matter of sugar duties has encouraged them to believe that the administration will urge congress to make concessions in the matter of that staple.

THE LUMBER DRIVES.

Good Prospects on the Tobique and Other Rivers.

The Tobique drives are about all out or nearing completion. R. A. Esley got his drive of 3,000,000 into the boom limits on Thursday night and he will be home this evening. McNair, who cuts about 2,000,000 on the Wapikwa, will be out with his cut next week. He operates for Hilyard Bros.

Reid and Murdoch's cut of 3,000,000 on the Gulkwa, in its corporation limits, is also their 2,000,000 on Sisson Brook. They also have 5,000,000 on Little Tobique, which has been cut about a week.

McNair also has 1,500,000 on the Serpentine for the Hilyards, which is coming along well. It is thought that every stock of lumber, except to finish steam driving about the middle of next week.

Daniel Nixon, who cuts about 1,500,000 for the Wm. Richards Company, will be out next week with all his cut.

James Burgess & Sons, who cut 2,000,000 for their mill on Little River, already have the lumber in boom limits; and the same is true of J. A. Patterson, who has a cut of 4,000,000 on Salmon River—Fredrick Gleason.

FAMILY BURNED TO DEATH.

Child Born During Progress of Fire—Body Found with Mother.

Houston, Tex., April 28.—In a fire which destroyed a stable and three residences this morning, John Copping, his wife and three children were burned to death. Mr. and Mrs. Jeff Hopper jumped from the burning building. Mr. Hopper's leg was fractured and Mrs. Hopper received internal injuries. The body of an infant of Mrs. Copping, which had been born during the progress of the fire, was found with its mother. A negro has been arrested on the charge of having fired the building to revenge his discharge by his former employer.

WILL MAKE ENQUIRY.

Government to Look Into the Charge of Combine.

Ottawa, April 26.—(Special).—The dominion government has decided as a recommendation of the minister of finance, to make an enquiry, under the combine clause of the customs duties act, into the charge, made by the executive of the Canadian Press Association that there is a combine in the manufacture of paper. An order-in-council has been passed appointing Judge Henri J. Taschereau, Montreal, of the supreme court, of the province of Quebec, to hold the investigation and take evidence upon oath and report to the government.

This will be the first enquiry that has ever been made under this clause, which was passed by the present government in 1897. The clause is section 18, chap. 18 of the customs act. It reads as follows: "Whenever the governor general in council has reason to believe that, with regard to any article of commerce, association or agreement of any kind among manufacturers of such article or dealers therein, is intended to enhance the price of such article or in any other way to unduly promote the advantage of the manufacturers or dealers at the expense of the consumers, the governor in council may commission or empower any judge of the supreme court of Canada, exchequer court of Canada or any supreme court in any province of Canada to enquire into a combination, association or agreement of any kind among manufacturers of such article or dealers therein, and to report to the governor in council the result of such enquiry."

"If the judge reports that such trust, combination, association or agreement exists, and if it appears to the governor-in-council that such disadvantage to the consumers is facilitated by the duties of customs imposed on the like article when imported, then the governor-in-council shall place such article on the free list or reduce the duty on it as to give to the public the benefit of reasonable competition in such article."

The Canadian Press Association first presented the case to Mr. Fielding in writing and afterwards a delegation representing the association waited on the minister and laid the facts before him. The information, of which Mr. Fielding was in possession by the complaints, is such as to warrant him to make the recommendation for an enquiry and an order has been adopted by the government for this purpose.

Judge Taschereau will name the place for holding the enquiry and for examining witnesses on oath. When this has been done, the judge will make a report to the government.

NEWS FROM MONCTON.

Major Astral Charged With Fortune Telling.—Point du Chene Harbor Clear of Ice.

Moncton, April 28.—(Special).—Proceedings have been commenced against Major Astral, who has been practicing palmistry here for the last three weeks. A charge of fortune telling has been preferred against the major, who was arraigned before Justice Hebert on Friday. The defendant put up bonds for his appearance on Monday. F. J. Sweeney is engaged by defense.

The steamer Northumberland arrived at Point du Chene this morning. Point du Chene harbor has been cleared of ice for the first time since yesterday, and the boats are expected to commence regular trips tomorrow.

Mr. Harold Brown, organist of St. David's church, St. John, presided at the organ in St. John's Presbyterian church at both services today and his playing created a very favorable impression. St. John's church is looking for an organist.

HELPED FROM BARROOM.

FELL AND NECK BROKEN.

Railway Man in Lewiston Met Death Yesterday.

Lewiston, Me., April 28.—Joseph McCreary, a section hand, employed on the lower Maine Central Railroad, met his death by falling from a platform in the town of No. 11 Main street, Lewiston, this morning at 9.20 o'clock. As a result of the fall, his neck was broken and death followed immediately.

The place where the accident occurred is the place where Miss Susie O'Connell, who has been in the business for many years. At the time of the accident Mrs. O'Connell was at church, and her sister, Mary Sullivan, was attending to the wants of the customers.

McCreary entered the house in an intoxicated condition, and, after making some loud talk, was told to leave. In doing so, it has been alleged that Miss Sullivan assisted him, and that as a result of said assistance, he fell off the platform and met his death.

Miss Sullivan furnished bail to the amount of \$2,000 for her appearance at court tomorrow morning.

BUT BRIEF LIBERTY.

Notorious Prisoner, Who Locked Sheriff in Cell and Got Away, Soon Recaptured.

Monticello, N. Y., April 28.—Ed. Sullivan, a noted horse breaker and allround crook, escaped from jail here last night. Under Sheriff Parks went into Sullivan's cell to close the windows preparatory to retiring for the night, when Sullivan, who had been waiting, pushed him behind the door and rushed out, closing the door and locking it, leaving Parks a prisoner and then passed out of the back door. Parks' cries for help brought Sheriff Dycker on duty, and he and a posse of deputies were quickly sworn in and went in pursuit. Sullivan was captured by ex-Sheriff Fulton 14 miles south of Monticello.

I. C. R. IMPROVEMENTS.

Travellers May Now Get Information of Trains at a Glance.

Quite a change was made about the I. C. R. train shed Saturday night in the way of large signboards which will prove very convenient to the travelling public. On either side of the gateway are three large boards which show by slides the time of departure and destination of trains on the different tracks in the train shed.

The number of the tracks can also be easily discerned by large signs suspended from the roof of the shed and which hang over the tracks.

A large, new turnstile has also been put in near the western end of the train shed to be used for persons leaving the shed, and this will save the usual inconvenience of a block at the gate after the departure of trains.
