SAIS LUMBER MARKET IS BAD

Prospects None Too Bright Just Now, Mr. Nordin Explains NOT DISCOURAGED

Lumbermen Optimistic Just the Same, Adds North Shore Operator—Look for Better Conditions When Money Markets Get Straightened Out—Lumber Journal's Comment.

Thursday, Dec. 18. That the prospects for a good lumber business during the present season are none too bright, that the trade is now bad, and that there is at the present time a very light demand indeed for lumber, was the substance of remarks made last evening by O. W. Nordin, of Miramichi, who is staying at the Royal Hotel.

"But lumbermen are optimistic," he said, "on account of the approaching Christmas season. The present tightness of money Mr. Nordin gave as his opinion of the cause of the poor prices offered and the unsatisfactory conditions of the market. There are perhaps other factors too, but it is not easy to get to the bottom of the matter. He expressed his hopes that as soon as the money market improves there will also be a noticeable improvement in the lumber conditions. That the cuts of lumber on the North Shore will be considerably restricted this winter was Mr. Nordin's forecast.

Mr. Nordin says most of his lumber is shipped to England, though some goes to Spain and some to Algeria and other points, so it was apparent from this he said, that the bad condition of affairs was not merely local. The following excerpt from the Canadian Lumberman and Woodworker deals with the state of the local market.

"The St. John (N. B.), lumber market is quiet on account of the approaching close of the year. Present prices of merchantable boards 4 in. and up wide spruce boards, planed and deals are selling at \$28 to \$25 and merchantable 2 x 8 in., 4 in., and 6 in. are bringing \$16 at the mill, 2 x 8 in., 4 in. and 6 in. are bringing \$20 to \$22. Stocks of 3 in. are moderate. Lath continue steady at about \$8 on the wharf at St. John and stocks are light. Refuse stocks are strong between \$10 to \$12 at the mill. Shingles continue in poor demand. Logging conditions are unfavorable at present, as the woods are still soft."

Harvey Station, Dec. 8.—Mrs. Wm. T. Colburn, who underwent a serious operation at the Victoria Hospital in Fredericton about six weeks ago, has not yet recovered and although considerably improved in health, is not yet able to leave the hospital.

Potato dealers are still loading potatoes here for the United States market, despite the frosty weather and the threatened embargo on Canadian potatoes. A large part of the potatoes are being handled by those who were vigorous opponents of reciprocity with the United States.

A few nights ago the granary of Thomas H. Lister at Frog Lake was broken into and about twenty bushels of oats and wheat were stolen. The thief had used for nearly a mile, but failed to locate him. Occurrences like this are very scarce in this section.

PINDER GETS A DOUBLE SUBSIDY FOR SPUR ROAD

Incidentally the "King of the Neckawick" Withdraws as Candidate for York County Vacancy.

Fredericton, N. B., Dec. 17.—The Southampton railway, extending from Miramichi to the St. John railway, a distance of thirteen miles, has been granted a double subsidy of \$6,400 a mile by the federal government. J. K. Pinder, M. P., is president of the board. The final payment of the subsidy amounting to \$82,000 synchronized with the recent levy vote last in St. John attended by Messrs. Pinder and McLeod.

It was generally known here weeks ago that Mr. Pinder had decided to offer as a Tory candidate for the federal seat for York in succession to O. S. Crocker. Pinder and McLeod, however, had favored another arrangement. The matter was talked over at a gathering in St. John a few weeks ago and was apparently fixed up to the satisfaction of Mr. Pinder. He dropped out of the race and announced his intention of supporting McLeod.

Now we have an announcement made in a letter from the acting minister of railways that the Southampton railway has been granted a double subsidy. The road was assisted from the provincial treasury by a bond guarantee of \$158,000, which, with a federal subsidy of \$81,250, brings the total government assistance up to \$239,250. In return for this large investment the province has a first mortgage on thirteen miles of railway equipped with second-hand equipment, and the railway contractors declare that the road could not have cost \$160,000 at the very outset.

In a statement filed with the clerk of the peace in a suit brought by contractors to build the road against Pinder, the actual cost of construction work is put down at \$70,000. It is estimated that the amount expended for ties, bridges and fencing to be added to this sum would not exceed \$80,000, making the total cost of the road \$150,000.

The road is now being operated by G. P. R. on a percentage basis and enjoys a fair trade. When the railway is completed, however, it will have to depend largely for its freight business on the output of Mr. Pinder's mill at Temperance, Yale.

P. E. Island Tories in Merry War

Prince county, a brother of a member of the provincial government.

This aroused the ire of the Conservatives of Queens County, in which Charlottetown is situated. They contended that if there is to be a new man appointed, they cannot see any reason why there should be, the office should go to a Queens man. Donald Nicholson, one of the present Conservative members for Queens was in Ottawa, and interviewed several members of the government. An interview with Mr. Nicholson appeared in the Montreal Mail, in which he strongly denounced the attempt of certain Conservatives in the western part of the Island to usurp offices that properly belong to Queens.

Senator Murphy came down to Queens county and soon afterwards, a circular letter was sent out to one of the districts just outside of Charlottetown, but in Queens county, calling on the faithful to hold a meeting and asking them to pass a resolution protesting strongly against Mr. Nicholson, who, they alleged, was not working in harmony with the big men of the party. Mr. Nicholson, although a Conservative, is too independent to be heeded and bullied and no doubt when his Scotch blood gets properly warmed, there will be something of interest at the next Conservative convention.

A certain wing of the party has been endeavoring to call a convention in which to thresh out the whole situation, but so far without success. There are quite a number mentioned as possible candidates in addition to the present sitting members. Messrs. McLean and Nicholson, Alexander Martin, ex-M. P. one of the most experienced politicians in their ranks, who made a strong fight for the seat, only to be "disappointed," is now announced as a candidate.
