Prohibition of the Exportation of COAL TO CANADA.

We find the following paragraph going the rounds of our American exchanges:
 "One of our coal merchants informs us that he received notice yesterday from a Government official, forbidding any further exportation of coal to Canada. The trade in this line has heretofore been immense, supplying a pressing want of our Provincial neighbors, and constituting a profitable business to several extensive dealers on this side. The sudden embargo is not understood. What does it mean?"—*Quebec Palladium*.
 This is what it means: Canada imports all her anthracite coal from the United States and during the past two years the coal merchants of Canada have been doing a thriving business in supplying the steamers engaged as blockade runners, at Newau, with United States anthracite coal, without which they could not escape the vigilance of our blockading fleets, as bituminous coal would make too much smoke. Last summer the attention of the United States Government was called to this trade, and it has now properly been stopped. We are sorry for the "pressing want of our Provincial neighbors," but before they get any more coal they must limit their operations. Uncle Sam is liberal, but it is too much to ask him to send the English blockade runners that will enable them to supply the rebels with the munitions of war.—*Chicago Tribune*.
 We cannot believe that the statements contained in the above paragraph are true, they involve such manifest absurdities. In the first place, Canada has not supplied blockade runners with anthracite coal. The trade and navigation returns for 1863 have not yet been published, but in 1862, not a single barrel of coal was sent to the "pressing want of our Provincial neighbors." Furthermore, coal is among the products, free importation of which is guaranteed by the Reciprocity Treaty.—*Globe*.

THE LAST OF THE LOYALISTS.

Mr. Archibald Crawford who died on Monday last at Musquodoboit Harbor in the 101 year of his age, was a native of South Carolina, and of Scottish parentage. He was a Loyalist, and witnessed the first American Revolution, and when the great revolution was over young Crawford and his parents made the best of their way to Nova Scotia, in order to preserve their allegiance to George III. He lived for many years on the Musquodoboit River near Crawford Falls, where his hospitality was often enjoyed by travellers. From this place he removed to Porter's Lake, where his house was always the home of Presbyterian clergymen of standing there. For the last few years he lived with his grandchildren at Musquodoboit Harbor. His wife who died about five years ago was also a Loyalist. Mr. Crawford was probably the last of the Refuge Loyalists in the Province. He has a clear recollection of all the stirring times when the great Republic first took its place among the nations; and he survived two years the existence of the Union.—*Halifax Reporter*.
