Town Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening, with the Mayor and all the Councillors present.

A written report was presented by the Finance Committee showing an expenditure during the month of \$1,328.42, the receipts for the same period being \$427.01. The overdraft at the bank now amounts to \$455.69. This includes \$752.67 paid out for street construction.

A letter was read from Mr. H. E. Arnold asking for an advance of ten dollars for services as auditor for 1910. This request was not granted.

A petition from Mr. E. L. Smith for a license for conducting a pool-table was not granted.

A letter was read from J. C. Macintosh & Co., of Halifax, offering to sell \$3000 of our sewer 4 per cent. bonds for 100 1/2 per cent. This matter was left with the Finance Committee.

The mayor called attention to the offer of Heaton's Agency to advertise the town of Wolfville in their publications. The Recorder ruled that the town money could not be legally expended for that purpose. The Mayor also called attention to a request for contributions for a testimonial to Miss George and Queen Mary at the approaching coronation.

The Finance Committee having reported the rate-roll correct it was resolved, that the date for payment of taxes for 1911 be June 1st, and that the usual discount of 2 1/2 per cent. be allowed on taxes paid by that date.

Dr. MacKinnon's Lecture.

The people of Wolfville who availed themselves of the opportunity were given a rare treat in the Presbyterian church on Monday night. The occasion was that of a popular lecture given by Rev. Clarence MacKinnon, Principal of the Presbyterian College, Halifax. Rev. Mr. Miller, the pastor of the church, presided and introduced the speaker in fitting terms.

The subject was, 'The Public Man,' and in his own inimitable manner Dr. MacKinnon pictured what a public man should be. He should be educated and farseeing, should have good manners, integrity of character, a broad sympathy and a great love for his fellow man.

No report can do justice to any address given by Principal MacKinnon. It is not only what he says nor the way he says it, but the mass that stands behind the utterance. Rarely does one see a combination of such qualities as he possesses. His exact scholarship, his pure English, his fund of humor, his unselfish character make him a man much to be desired. Those who heard him on Monday night will give him an abundant welcome when he comes to us again.

At the close of the lecture Rev. Mr. Dixon, in a few well chosen words, moved a vote of thanks to the lecturer which was seconded by Mr. Allen and heartily responded to by the audience.

Too much praise cannot be given to the quartette for the splendid rendering of 'Nearer my God to Thee,' which brought to a close a very pleasant and profitable evening.

Butter and Reciprocity.

The Americans produce the same class of products as we do, in vastly greater quantities.

Only the other day a Chicago produce merchant wired a Montreal packing house, offering 300 tubs of creamery butter at 18 cents per pound. Such butter was at the time being shipped to Montreal dealers, by the farmers of Quebec province, for from 24 to 25 cents per pound. And under the Fielding-Taft agreement all other British dominions would have in our markets the same privilege as those which will be afforded to the United States. This to-day means much to the Canadian farmers' home market. On March 16th the S. S. 'Wakarusa' from New Zealand, landed in St. John 750 carcasses of chilled lamb, that were sold in Montreal, duty and freight paid, at 9 1/2 cents per pound. Even with a duty of 3 cents this lamb undersells Canada.

The Statute of Limitation.

To the Editor of THE ACADIAN.

DEAR SIR:—Will you kindly allow me space in your columns to ask a few questions, which I trust some of your readers, learned in the law, will answer for me. First: What is the time limit and object of what is called in our Code of Laws the Statute of Limitations? Second: What are the limits of said statute; does it apply to all transactions between debtor and creditor, or in its operations confined to certain well defined cases? Third: Does the statute forbid the payment of just claims after the lapse of a certain stated time, and attach a penalty for violation of its decrees; or does it simply open a door of escape for those who are looking for some way of paying their just debts without parting with their money? Fourth: How far is a Christian justified in taking advantage of the said Statute of Limitations to evade the payment of just debts for value received? By the term Christian I do not mean a church member, necessarily, either a door-keeper or deacon, but a real follower of Christ!

If some of our resident clergymen will give us the benefit of their views on this last question, I know they will be gladly received by the general public as well as by.

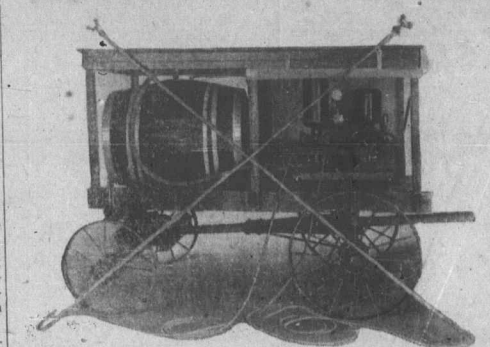
