forced to cut back. He told the 17th Annual Meeting of the Mississauga Hospital corporation that the 500-bed hospital has double the complement of doctors normally attached to a facility that size.

There are 202 doctors (ineluding consultants, honorary and associate members) with privileges at the hospital com-pared to a normal comple-ment of 100-125.

However, of that number only about 50 per cent take part in the operation and planning of hospital medical services, said Griggs.

"It is wrong that the ad-ministrative load is carried by a few willing and dedi-cated men. We, as a board, expect doctors to participate in hospital affairs and not simply use the services pro-vided."

Griggs hinted that doctors not taking part in committees running the hospital could have their privileges revoked if the hospital was obliged to reduce its staff.

Hospital revenue up 22% in year

MISSISSAUGA — The Cor-poration of Mississauga Hospital reports a 22 per cent in-crease in revenue last year over 1969 up from \$6.8-million to \$8.4 million.

The hospital deficit drop-ped from \$53,398 in 1969 to 27,021, according to a state-ment delivered at the corporation's 17th annual meet-ing held last Thursday night. Net cost per patient day rose from \$40.09 to \$46.21. "Seventy per cent of all money paid out by the hos-pital goes back to the com-munity," said W. G.
