## Hospital revenue up 22% in year

MISSISSAUGA — The Corporation of Mississauga Hospital reports a 22 per cent increase in revenue last year over 1969 up from \$6.8-million to \$8.4 million.

The hospital deficit dropped from \$53,398 in 1969 to \$27,021, according to a statement delivered at the corporation's 17th annual meeting held last Thursday night.

Net cost per patient day rose from \$40.09 to \$46.21.

"Seventy per cent of all money paid out by the hospital goes back to the community," said W. G. McLarty, hospital treasurer, "because it goes out in wages."

Total hospital assets were listed at \$10.9 million up from \$10.6 million the year before.

The balance sheet and statement of revenue and expenditure were audited by Saddington, Greenfield and Co., Chartered Accountants of Port Credit.

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## Surplus of Mississauga doctors creates "unhealthy competition"

MISSISSAUGA — An unusually high concentration of doctors in Mississauga is causing "unhealthy competition" for beds and services in Mississauga Hospital and F. E. P. Griggs, hospital board chairman warned last Thursday that some doctors might have their hospital privileges revoked if the hospital was forced to cut back.

He told the 17th Annual Meeting of the Mississauga Hospital corporation that the 500-bed hospital has double the complement of doctors normally attached to a facility that size.

There are 202 doctors (including consultants, honorary and associate members) with privileges at the hospital compared to a normal complement of 100-125.

However, of that number only about 50 per cent take part in the operation and planning of hospital medical services, said Griggs.

"It is wrong that the administrative load is carried by a few willing and dedicated men. We, as a board, expect doctors to participate in hospital affairs and not simply use the services provided."

Griggs hinted that doctors not taking part in committees running the hospital could have their privileges revoked if the hospital was obliged to reduce its staff.

**OVERALL INJUSTICE**  
He said the high doctor ratio in Mississauga Hospital is due to the fact that the town is rapidly expanding and attracting great numbers of professional business people.

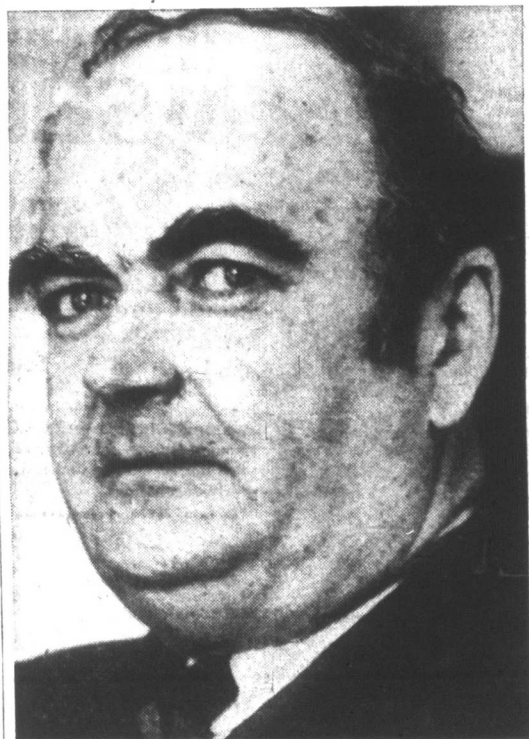
He said the hospital now had more doctors per bed capacity than it could properly handle and there was little hope of expanding the hospital for some years.

"It seems an overall injustice . . . in that we have close to double the number of doctors of other hospitals our

size while some areas are desperately short of medical people."

Griggs added that it is difficult to refuse hospital privileges to any qualified doctor who moves into Mississauga. He suggested that the Ontario Medical Association set

guidelines for hospitals to follow and set a maximum number of doctors to be extended privileges. The OMA should establish as one criterion for making decisions on extension of privileges, an assessment of the doctor's involvement with the hospital.

## 22 Streetsville cadets in Toronto-based corps

STREETSVILLE — Major D. S. Pelz, Commanding Officer of the No. 1888 2nd Fd. Engr. Reg. Cadet Corps reported that the Streetsville Squadron of his Toronto Based Army Cadet Corps is now up to approximately 22 cadets from the Streetsville area.

He mentioned that training was coming along favorably and several weekend exercises are planned with the Bruce Trail Organization and the newly formed Credit Valley Trail Walkers Assoc., where the cadets will be utilized to repair and maintain bridges and pathways, etc. of the Trail plus build new shelters for the Trail Walkers.

Captain H. Burgess of Mississauga is now co-ordinating all engineering training with the cadet corps regarding both the basic army engineering subjects and the engineering required for the Bruce Trail tasks.

Major Pelz feels that the specialization of his Army Cadet Corps should be utilized for both the feeling of accomplishment of the Cadets and the enjoyment of the local residents and outdoor nature lovers who utilize the Trails and Structures repaired and built by the Cadets.

To carry on this training and expand the programs to utilize all cadets possible Major Pelz is presently look-

ing for five more qualified cadet instructors to aid him and his other officers with his current training program. Ex Permanent Force or Militia personnel with a sincere interest in boys and army training who were previously sergeants, warrant officers, or officers should contact Major D. S. Pelz directly for further details. The Cadet Corps parades every Wednesday and Friday night at Fort York Armouries, Toronto from 6:45 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. The Streetsville Cadets are transported down in Toronto by army vehicles each parade night.

A new drive for recruits for the Cadet Corps will be started shortly after the number of instructors has been brought up to strength. The total corps strength is now over 100 boys which includes two Squadrons and a trumpet band in Toronto and one Squadron in Streetsville.

The boys are from ages 13 to 19. Future expansion of the Cadet Corps is expected in the Streetsville area and the new instructors are required now to establish realistic training timetables.
