Memorandum to
H.E. the Gov Genl.

Lester Jan 10. 1860

The Supt Genl of I.A. has the honor respectfully to
invite the attention of H.E. the Gov Genl to the necessity of
providing for the support of the I.D. under the circum-
stances detailed as follows

The Imperial Govt in 1856 decided to allow £3000
sterling per annum towards this Dept for a period not exceeding
2 or 3 years - In 1858 this amount was reduced one half,
& notice was given that it would be totally withdrawn in
1860 - So much this deficiency thus arising 10 p.c. of all
the invested Land Funds of the Indians was set apart in 1857
& the interest accruing therefrom is now available for defraying
in part the annual expenditure - The fund so created
amounts in round numbers to \$100,000 - The interest on
it to say \$6000* - The ordinary expenses of the Dept at
present after making the reductions suggested by the Commissioners
in 1858, cannot be set down as less than \$16000 -

The Supt Genl ventures to suggest, that the Canadian
Legislature should be asked to give in the ensuing session \$12,000
to cover the deficiency.

The Supt Genl would represent in explanation of the
\$2000 beyond the sum recommended by the
Commissioners that there are this year expenses which
must be met connected with the survey of the lands lately

* This amount may be increased by the investment of the
balance now to the credit of the fund - about \$10,000 giving an
interest of \$600 -

surrounded by tribes having as yet no funds of their own -

There seems little to be paid to the Province when the
lands are sold - This confidently hoped that perhaps
the amount to be asked for will be considerably smaller.

Memorandum
H.E. the Gov General

Lester Jan 14. 1860

The Superintendent General of Indian
Affairs, in connection with his Memo of
the 10 Inst, begs to submit for the consideration
of H.E. the Gov Genl the accompanying schedule
from which it appears that \$464,508.19 are now
actually due by parties who have bought
Indian Land - of this sum \$199,991.67 are
principal & interest on instalments long since
overdue; in some cases 2 years & upwards -

The purchase of these lands may be divided
into 2 classes - actual settlers & speculators -

The Supt Genl suggests that steps should be
taken for the recovery of the arrears, but he is of
opinion that a distinction might advantageously
be made, between these 2 classes in the time
given them to pay up - He would therefore
propose that public notice should be given to all
purchasers in default to pay before the expiration
of 6 months, stating at the same time, that
actual settlers would be allowed a further grace of
6 months on satisfactory proof being furnished
to the Dept, before the 1st July next, that such parties
were actually cultivating the land before the date
at which the notice was issued - The local
Supts could act as Commissioners for determining
such questions of settlement

By this means farmers would have the
advantage of supplying the proceeds of their night
harvest towards the payment for their lots, while
