revolted colonies in consequence of our attachment to hi Majesty and the British Government, the same being in see simple; by which tenure, we humbly pray to hold these lands subject only to the yearly quitrent of one half-penny per acre, and from our long fufferings, and exertious in support of our mild and lenient government under which we were brought up, namely the British Constitution, we humbly pray to be governed in these new fettlements, by the fame as British subjects after the custom and manner the same was administered in the late Province of New-York, under the Governor and Council of faid Province in the year of one thousand seven hundred fixty and three.

That, your lor flip would be pleased to send a Surveyor to measure our lands and fix our boundaries and point out our lands that we are to receive from his Majesty, before that others, who are not under the character of fuffering loyalifts

can be settled.

That your Lordship, in the regulation of the Militia of these Settlements, would be pleased to permit the inhabitants of the fettlements to nominate fuch officers as they are to ferve under as Militia. 28 with fuch they are at all times ready to risque their lives in support of His Majesty and in defence of his dominions.

Your lordship's attention to those matters will lay us under a duty ever to pray for your lordship.
