CONFIRMATION

A Large Class of Candidates Con-
firmed by Bishop Williams in Christ
Church Last Evening.

Bishop Williams, of London, the new Bishop of Eborac, paid his first official visit to Chatham last evening, when he conducted confirmation in Christ Church. There was a very large congregation present to witness the ceremony, which was very solemn and impressive. There was also a very large class of candidates for confirmation and it was a very pretty and pleasing sight to see the girl candidates who were also becomingly dressed in white, receiving the bishop's blessing at the communion table.

The Bishop made a very favorable and lasting impression upon both the congregation and the candidates. His address to the class was on the first commandment, "Thou Shalt Love the Lord Thy God with all Thy Heart, Soul and Mind," and impressed upon each candidate the importance of having the Love of God in their hearts.

"Good acts do not necessarily make good men," said he; "it is the nature of the good acts that strengthen character. There are professional duties that we are forced to do and the doing of these are not make character. While these are all in themselves excellent, good things, they are based on good motives. There is no credit in refraining from doing wrong because we are not expected to do wrong. To say that a man during his life did no harm is to say that his life was a failure. We must not only refrain from doing wrong but we must also do good to man."

"If we have the love of God in our hearts we will love what he holds dear. May this first confirmation be the controlling motive of your life, for it is only such parts of life as spring from the love of God that will be your own abiding possession for time and for eternity."

The Bishop closed his able address by pointing out the help which is given to nourish this love for God, such as the reading of the Bible and the communion.

The Bishop had a kindly word for each one of the candidates as they came forward for their certificates after the service.

\$75,000 FIRE AT LONDON.

Disastrous Blaze Caused By a Rocket
Eats Up Value.

London, May 26.—At 2 o'clock yesterday morning fire in the Dymott Baker Co.'s planing mill, a box factory, in less than two hours consumed the factory, together with a part of the London Machine Tool Co.'s plant to the east, over a million feet of lumber belonging to the Dymott Baker Co. piled across the street; three M. C. R. cars, containing \$50,000 worth of machinery, which were on the street between the mill and the lumber, and \$30,000 worth of hardwood lumber stored in the yard of Tumbler & Jones, builders, in rear of the tool company's works. The loss will be fully \$75,000, with about \$50,000 insurance. Of the loss \$12,000 is sustained by the machine tool company, and from \$30,000 to \$35,000 by the Dymott Baker Co. The Dymott Baker Co. Central mill is responsible to the Dymott Baker Co. for their loss on machinery. The fire is supposed to have been caused by a rocket.

Bad Fire in Brussels.
Brussels, May 26.—Shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, smoke was seen rising from the stables of the Queen's Hotel. The flames crossed the street to Waller's Livery stable and adjoining buildings, thence northerly towards the river. Several buildings were totally destroyed, including the stables of the American Hotel, Peter Scott's blacksmith shop, F. Adams, agricultural implement and Ross grist mill and adjacent buildings. The electric light powerhouse was badly scorched. Large pieces of burning timber were carried across the Maitland River and the carriage factory, owned by J. C. Coker & Son was entirely consumed. The fire burned itself out and was subdued. Wingham and Listowel fire brigades arrived about 5 o'clock. The loss is estimated at about \$35,000; insurance unknown.

Fire at Sturgeon's Falls.
Sturgeon Falls, May 26.—Cockburn & Sons' sawmill was destroyed by fire about midnight Wednesday. This will be a loss to the town, as quite a number of men have been employed. The loss is partly covered by insurance.

JEWS FIGHT AT WARSAW

Eight Are Dead, 100 Are Wound-
ed, 19 of Them Seriously.

Bundites Began Work of Reform, and
the Respectable Element Turned Out
to Demolish the Property of the Dis-
reputable Classes—No Pillaging, But
the Destruction of Property Has
Been Absolute.

Warsaw, Russian Poland, May 26.—
The Jewish disorders here Wednesday
night arose from an attempt of the
Jewish Socialist organization, called the
Bund to purge the Hebrew district of
Warsaw of all disreputable persons.
The Bundites with the view of expell-
ing their undesirable co-religionists
commenced to wreck disorderly houses,
fences, and other resorts. The fight-
ing spread to the surrounding streets,
continued until midnight and recom-
menced yesterday morning. The Bund-
ites have been permitted to carry on
the work of destruction without any
interference on the part of the au-
thorities. Fourteen of those wounded
Wednesday night are reported to be
dying.

Eight Killed; 100 Wounded.
The disturbances continued all day
and were still in progress late last
night. Eight persons have already been
killed and 100 wounded, 19 seriously.
The damage to property has been con-
siderable. There has been no pillag-
ing, but the destruction of the furni-
ture in the houses has been absolute.
The mob, armed with axes, smashed
the doors and windows and brought
the furniture out on the streets, where
they broke it into small pieces. The
owners of the furniture, in attempting
to save their belongings, were attack-
ed, beaten and even killed. Late last
night, a mob of about 100 persons,
armed with axes, smashed the doors
of eight houses, and carried out the
furniture, which they broke into small
pieces. The police did not interfere actively
during the day.

The affair is a conflict between the
respectable Jewish social classes and
the disreputable Jewish element. The
report is that the respectable Jews,
tired of hearing the members of their
race called opprobrious names, resolv-
ed, as the police were receiving bribes
for protecting disreputable houses and
persons, to take the matter into their
own hands. Another report has it that
Jewish roughs, in the guise of mem-
bers of the Bund, were levying black-
mail upon shopkeepers.

Extraordinary scenes were witness-
ed last night when the crowds vis-
ited the better section of the city and
demolished apartments filled with cost-
ly effects.

The affair was carefully organized.
The leaders were supplied with the ad-
dresses of the owners of disreputable
houses and scarcely a single resort in
Warsaw escaped destruction.

The Caucasians Escaped Again.
St. Petersburg, May 26.—The most
grievous news regarding the internal
situation, and of the renewal of hos-
tilities between Armenians and Mos-
lems, in the southern Caucasus, has
reached St. Petersburg.

Chicago, May 26.—The strike did not
