Diseases of Children.

The average parent is too apt to consider the milder contagious diseases of child-hood simply as inconveniences—of only temporary detriment to their victim. But we must recognize the scientific fact that no disease ever leaves the physical system absolutely unimpaired. To this we must add the fact that with healthy children growth is constant, and that the arresting of that growth by any disease really digrowth is constant, and that the arresting of that growth by any disease really diminishes to just such a degree as it extends the ultimate size and vigor of the child who suffers from the disease. Contagious diseases, however harmless they may seem, should never be knowingly incurred, for even their least injurious recurred, for even their least injurious results are unknown quantities, militating against the development of the child, while there is always risk of more serious manifestations, whose evil consequences may extend through the whole life of the child and seriously impair both its usefulness and happiness. Therefore it is only our plain duty to guard against contagious disease as long and as far as may be. This is now possible to an extent never before conceived of. We at present understand, to a degree at least, the nature of conta-gious diseases, and out of this knowledge we gain power to avoid or to abort the dis-

ase. - Harper's Bazar. Hunting Trophies In the Household. One of the curious fads of the day is the use of some hunting trophy as an ar ticle of household funiture or decoration.

Man and woman are both enthusiasts upon this subject. The man's den, studio or library must contain a piece of this kind, the foundation of which was gained in some fall or winter hunting trip, while the feminine boudoir or drawing room also boasts one presented by a masculine admirer. Among the skins figuring most prominently in this way is that of the elephant. Strange as it seems, the hide of this ungainly creature can be and is used in a dozen unique ways. The leg of the elephant forms an odd corner closet. The skin of a "baby" of the species makes an armchair. Another weird chair is covered with the skins of small animals, such as the red fox, otter, etc. The arms and legs of the seat terminate in the heads of these tiny beasts, which are placed where knobs would occur in the everyday article. Bears are greatly in use among those who go in for this fad. One fashionable house owns a stuffed bear arranged as a species of dumb waiter. Hat racks from small legs and feet of deer and kindred creatures are much in evidence.—Buffalo Commercial.

Pleasant Luncheon Brink.

A pleasant drink frequently offered at luncheons is made from orange juice. Tall glasses are filled one-third full with finely cracked ice, over which orange juice is poured till the liquid is brought to the half measure. A siphon of vichy offer-ed frequently to add to the juice gives a bubble and foam to the drink which completes its relish. Orange juice chilled in ice and salt and served in tall glasses, with a strawberry, slice of banana, a grape cut and seeded, a die of pineapple, or any sea-sonable treatment with fruit is another agreeable drink to sip through a luncheon in lieu of wine. Women who are careful of their complexions know the harm to them of wine drinking and much prefer fruit juice de octions. The juice may be chilled sufficiently by putting it in a tin pail and placing that in a pan with a layer of ice and salt to the depth of a couple of inches on the bottom for an hour before luncheon. Watch that the freezing point is not reached, as may happen if there is too much ice and sait to the amount of juice.-New York Post.

Cooking Prunes. Miss Parloa's statement at a Pratt institute lecture in regard to the cooking of prunes will be received with surprise by many housekeepers who have considered that long soaking was the most necessary part of the process of preparing this fruit for the table. Miss Parloa does not soak them at all, though for other dried fruit she approves of immersion in cold water over night. Her method of preparing prupes is to wash each carefully in tepid water, letting them stand two or three minutes in the water to swell; then to wash a second time, and put on at once in a saucepan with cold water, in the proportion of 11/2 cups of cold water to a cup of prunes. They should simmer slowly for at least 2 hours, possibly 21/4. Another new direction is that no sugar is to be used, the natural sweetness of the fruit being sufficient if it is properly brought out.

Towel Hoop.

To make a towel hoop, take three pieces of rope 38 inches long, and make a three strand braid—if you want a heavier one use four strands. Then lap the ends about six inches past each other, and tie securely with twine. Unbraid these and leave them in wavy tassels.

Tie with orange satin ribbon and leave a loop and bow to hang it up.

These towel hoops are very pretty and novel. They are just the thing for the bathroom, and are extremely easy to make.

Creased Woolen Dresses. When woolen dresses or any woolen garments have become badly creased and wrinkled, do not attempt to use a het iron upon them, for it is likely to leave the mark of the iron and give the material a shiny look without producing any good re-sults. If the crushed and marred places are wiped with a woolen cloth wet in hot water and the clothing is then hung out the air or in a cold place, the marks

will all disappear. Bathtub Mats.

The glassy finish of porcelain bathtubs sometimes proves dangerous. More than one case of broken rib or serious bruise has been caused by slipping and falling against the iron rim or sides. Cork mats or long, small sized rubber ones are frequently put in the bottom of such highly finished tubs to afford a foethold. The rubber mats are to be preferred, as the cork ones chip off from frequent soaking and pieces are apt to clog the pipes.

To Make Feathers Stand.

To trim a hat with ostrich feathers bend the wire stem at the lower end so as to form an L or right angle with the upright part, making this L long enough to be folded back on itself.

By sewing the wires of this loop very firmly with strong thread, the feather will stand up in a more airy fashion and be kept in place better than in any other way.




