HERE AND THERE
Cocoa passed as currency among
the natives of Central and South
America at the time of the European
conquest. Joseph Acosta, in 1610,
tells us the Indians used "none of
their gold or silver for traffic in or
the market, and until this day the
custom continues among them that
instead of money they use cocoa."
The Aztecs of ancient Mexico also
used "cocoa" as small change, as
many as 8,000 beans being counted
legal tender. The value of the beans
may be judged from the fact that "a
tolerably good slave" could be pur-
chased for 100 of them.
The discovery of Roman relics on
the site of the old Grand Post Of-
fice in St. Martin's le Grand recalls
the fact that a fragment of the old
Roman wall was laid bare in 1891.
Hard by is London Stone, one of
the most interesting remains of that
period. It is believed to be the
"milliarium" or milestone, from
which were measured the Roman
roads all over England.
Where Italians are fighting Aus-
trians at from 7,000 to 10,000 feet
above sea-level, ordinary gun sights
are useless, because in the rarefied
air of such altitudes shells and bul-
lets travel further than at sea level,
where sights are usually tested. Ita-
lian mountain guns therefore have
specially constructed sights, for war
has never been waged so far up in
the air before.
At present 30,000 drivers are in
active service at the British front,
driving motor trucks, carrying sup-
plies and ammunition. This number
does not include hospital corps, am-
bulances, armored cars, etc., but sim-
ply supplies transport service. The
men receive six shillings (\$1.34) a
day for the skilled veterans, and one
and one-half shillings (36 cents) a
day for the novices.
