THE TEACHING PROFESSION

During the past year, in almost every part of the province, there has been a scarcity of qualified teachers, and many sections have been served by teachers whose certificates had expired and in some cases by high school graduates who had never modeled. This undesirable condition is not the result of any sudden change in the aspirations of the young men and women of the country, but is due rather to the growth of the conviction that the salary paid is not sufficient to properly compensate the teachers for the years of study and amount of money spent in preparing for the work. The Gananoque Reporter deals with the subject in this way:—

"In Ontario there are 54 County Model Schools and 3 Normal Schools for the training of second-class teachers and the Normal College for first-class and high school teachers. All these schools are now in session with attendances considerably smaller than usual. Already there is a scarcity of teachers throughout many of the rural sections so that in the near future there is the prospect of a dearth of teachers so great as to seriously threaten the efficiency of the educational system of the province.

"At the Normal College, Hamilton, there are 124 students of whom only 39 are men; at the Toronto Normal School there are 96 students, 93 women and 3 men; at Ottawa Normal School 40 students, 35 women and 5 men; at London Normal School, 73 students, 67 women and 6 men. In some of the Model schools the proportion is even greater. For instance at Gananoque the students are all women.

"There is no doubt that low salaries is the main if not the only cause of this unsatisfactory state of affairs. Better financial inducements must be offered before young men will be tempted to look to teaching even as a temporary occupation, much less to choose it as their life-work."
