It's just a case with most of us to work from the time we first of us in the morning till it's time to close 'em at night. I'd like to see the matter taken up here."

The strikers at the Dominion Steel Works at Sydney, N. S., have accepted the Government's offer to endeavor to bring about a reconciliation.

At Orangeton mines William Wele, an engineer, who was attacked by eight Swedish miners armed with knives and a hatchet, has died of his injuries.

A Glace Bay despatch says it is stated there that the Nova Scotia Steel & Coal Co. have leased all the submarine areas, outside of the Dominion Coal Company's areas, and for a distance of ten miles out.

The liner St. Louis, crippled at sea, is off New York and will dock to-day.

The Russian authorities are banishing or imprisoning many prominent Finlanders.

The Vice-Governor of Elizabethopol, in Transcaucasia, Russia, was assassinated.

It is reported that the United States will lodge a protest against the Canadian immigration propaganda in the former country.

GRACIOUS AOT

London, July 17.—King Edward, in reply to a message from the staff Council of the Salvation Army, expressing appreciation of his Majesty's welcome to the international congress of the army, and "gratitude to God for his Majesty's efforts in the cause of international peace," sends his thanks through Lord Francis Knollys, his Secretary. He says he "rejoices to think that his efforts to promote international peace and good-will have not been entirely without effect," and "that he trusts that the good work the Salvation Army has already achieved by its faith and energy may be constantly increased."

WAS MURDERED

St. Petersburg, July 17.—The Vice-Governor of Elizabethopol was assassinated at seven o'clock this evening.

The assassination occurred at Adzhikent, a small place in the southeast corner of the Government of Elizabethopol, close to the Persian frontier.

Elizabethopol is in the Government of Transcaucasia, having Erivan and Tiflis in the west, Daghestan in the north, Baku in the east, and Turkish Armenia in the south.
