SIR RICHARD JEBB DIES.

Noted Greek Scholar and Public Man Passes Away.
London, Dec. 11.—Sir Richard Claverhouse. Jebb, regius professor of Greek and member of Parliament (Con-servative) for Cambridge University, is dead. He was born in Dundee on Aug. 27, 1841, and educated at Charterhouse, whence he passed to Trinity College, Cambridge, where he graduated as senior classic in 1862. After becoming fellow and lecturer of that college and public curator of the university, Sir Richard filled the chair of Greek in Glasgow University from 1875 to 1889, when he became regius professor and was lecturer at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, in 1892. His services to education were very great, and he was universally recognized as one of the best Greek scholars in Britain. His publications included many translations from Greek and Latin authors, his magnum opus in this

line being his edition of Sophocles in seven volumes, which appeared at intervals from 1883 to 1896. He was married in 1874 to Caroline Lane, daughter of the Rev. J. Reynolds, D.D., and widow of Gen. A. J. Slemmer of the United States army. To Ebouise Wood. The wood is immersed for forty-eight hours in a hot, saturated solution of alum and then brushed over several times with a logwood decoction prepar ed as follows: Boil one part of best logwood with ten parts of water, filter through linen and evaporate at a gentle heat until the volume is reduced to onehalf. To every quart of this add from ten to fifteen drops of a saturated solu-tion of indigo, completely neutral. After applying this dye to the wood rub the latter with a saturated and filtered solution of verdigris in hot, concentrat ed acetic acid, and repeat the operation antil a black of the desired intensity is obtained. COUGHS AND COUGHING.

Nature's Method of Clearing the Air Passages-Useless Coughs,

A cough was intended by nature at a means of removing some offending substance from the air passages, and as such it is of the greatest protection if the irritation of the mucous membrane of the larynx and bronchia tubes, caused by the presence of some strange body or of the usual mucous secretion in too great quantity, did not excite the expulsive act which we call coughing we should be in constant danger of suffocation every time we had a slight attack of bronchitis or a cold in the chest.

If a cough were occasioned only in this way it would be a most useful measure, and there would be no more A cough was intended by nature at

measure, and there would be no more measure, and there would be no more need for cough mixtures than for rem edies to arrest breathing, but the hu man machine sometimes gets out of order, like any other mechanism. The wires get crossed, and a message sent from some distant organ, like the liver for example, may get switched over to the nerve centre which regulates the complex series or movements produc-ing cough. This centre, receiving stimulus from somewhere, responds just as if the message came from the larynx, and a cough is established.

This "lives cough" does no good, and the sconer it is stopped the better.

Again, the mucous membrane of some portion of the air tubes, instead

of secreting too freely, may become dry. The nerve centre is warned me chanically that there is something irritating the larynx or bronchial tubes and it starts a cough to get rid of it. This cough, too, is useless, and worse than useless, for it serves only to irri-tate still more the inflamed mucous

Cough may also be excited by ab formal conditions in the nose, ears or gullet or may occur as a symptom of disease of the heart, kidneys or of disease of the heart, kidneys or nervous system. In such cases it is the endeavor of the physician to arrest the cough by discovery and removal of the cause, if possible, or, if this cannot be done, by the administration

cannot be done, by the administration of cough remedies.

In cough due to dryness of the mucous membrane of the air tubes the remedies employed are those that will promote a flow of nucous to moisten the offending part. This can sometimes be accomplished without medicine, by the inhalation of the vapor rising from a pitcher of hot water to which a teasproporful of benzine has been added. conful of benzine has been adde Intil the cause of a cough is know the use of nowerful cough medicines most of which contain paregoric or only in some form, is most inadvis able.—Youth's Companion.

ANCIENT ENTERTAINMENT.

Description of One Given By Xen phon's Army of Greeks. In his "Anabasis" Xenophon

cribes an entertainment given by his army of Greeks on the shores of the Black Sea during the retreat from Persia after the battle of Cunaxa, about twenty-three centuries ago. "Two Thracians first rose up," says the sol-dier historian, "and danced with their arms to the sound of a flute. They capered very high and with great agilcapered very high and with great agility, then made use of their swords. At last one of them struck the other in such a manner that every one thought he had killed him, but the stroke was given with art. The other, having despoiled him of his arms, went out singing a song of triumph. Then other Thracians carried off the man as if he had been dead, though indeed he was not hurt. After this some Aenians and Magnesians rose up and danced in not burt. After this some Aenians and Magnesians rose up and danced in their arms what they called the carpaean dance, the manner of which is as follows: One of them, having laid down his arms, sows and drives a yoke of oxen, looking often behind him, as if he were afraid. Then a robber and the second of the if he were afraid. Then a robber approaches whom the other perceiving proaches whom the other perceiving he catches up his arms and, advancing, fights with him in defense of his oxen, All this these men performed in time to the flute. At last the robber binds

two adversaries, then used his bucklers as if engaged with only one. Sometimes he whirled round, then threw as if engaged with only one. Sometimes he whirled round, then threw himself head foremost and fell on his himself head foremost and fell on his feet without parting with his bucklers. This made a fine sight, Last of all he danced the Persian dance, striking his bucklers against each other and in dancing fell on his kness, then sprung up again, and in all this he kept time to the fute. He was succeeded by some Mantineans and other Arcadians, who, being dressed in the handsomest armor they could provide, rose up and advanced in time to a flute that played a martial air. They sung the paean and danced in the same manner that is practiced in solemn processions.

"On this one of the Arcadians led forth a woman dancer, dressed handforth a woman dancer, dressed handforth and carrying a light buckler. She danced the Pyrrhic dance with great ability, on which there was great applause. That caused the Paphlagoions who were present to ask whether the woman also charged with the troops. Then the Greeks said that it was the women who drove King Artaxerxes out of the camp. This was the end of that night's entertainment.—Chicago News.

Thick Wheat Sewing Profitable.

During a long period of test, experiments in thick and thin seeding were tried, by the Ohio Agricultural Station, the results indicating that eight to ten pecks of seed to the acre will give fetter results than a less amount of seed upon the somewhat worn lands of the state. The amount of seed should vary somewhat with different varieties, ace the size of the grain is not uniform. It was further found that September 20, to 22 proved a most salisfactory date for seeding in the latitude of Wooster, with September 15 the next highest in yield. No particular benefit was derived from grading grain according to size. Thick Wheat Sewing Profitable.
