Juvenile Todacco Users, Beware.

The following is the law in respect to selling tobacco to minors, as passed last winter: 1. Any person selling, giving, or causing to be sold, any cigars, cigarettes, smoking or chewing tobacco or opium to boys under 16 years of age, shall be liable to a fine not greater than \$20 or 30 days.

2. Any person who shall accept any money or other valuable consideration, to act as agent to anybody under 16, in procuring for such person any cigars, etc., shall be fined not greater than \$20 or 30 days.

3. Any person under 16 who has in his possession, or smokes cigars, etc., shall be fined not greater than \$5 or 7 days.
