Canadian Water-works Statistics.

On the average each person in Canada served by water-works uses 175 imperial gallons of water a day, and pays \$4.12 a year for it, according to a report on the water-works of Canada in preparation by the Commission on Conservation.

New Brunswick has the highest per capita consumption in Canada, viz. 161 gallons per head per day, while Manitoba and Saskatchewan have the lowest—46 gallons per head per day.

Acadia University Receives Request. New York, March 21st.—According to the deputy state appraiser's report, Dr. Charles F. Mayers, 811 West 48th street, who died in Boston on Aug. 22nd, 1911, left an estate of \$265,385, of which \$125,000 was invested in New York City realty.

By the terms of the will \$25,000 was given to Acadia University, Nova Scotia, for the establishment of a professorship in biology and zoology. The New Brunswick Sentinel also received a bequest of \$1,000.
