### DIARY OF MARGARET D. MICHENER

Father and Olivia called last evening; she has just returned from Halifax. Mary, Hibbart and family have gone to mother's for the day; they wished me to go too, but I feel too sad. I desire to look to God for strength. I trust his faithfulness and power to save me in the trying hour.

13th. Well here I am by the mercy of God, surrounded by kind friends who do all in their power to alleviate my sorrow. Yet all their kindness does not fill that vacancy there is in my heart. I feel comforted whilst reading the many promises in scripture. I trust in the promises and hope although this affliction is for the present grievous it will work for my good. I feel to cling more closely to him who has promised

each, and enable us to say "Thy will be done".

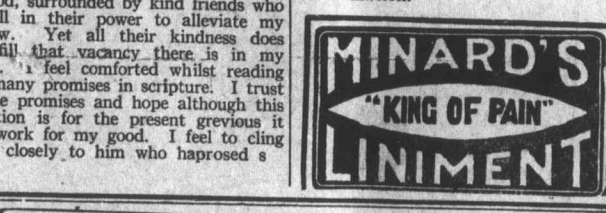
