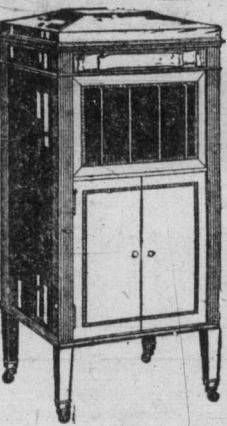

WHY MILK GOES UP

To the Editor of The Gleaner.
Sir—June, not July, is the "milk month." The flow of milk starts to decrease in July. It continues to decrease gradually until the last of the year. It begins to increase in January, and continues to increase until the peak is reached in June.

There will be no overproduction of milk this summer. Instead there is every likelihood of a shortage, not serious perhaps, but still a shortage. The farmer was compelled to take a comparatively low price during the winter and spring because the market was not favorable for the sale of his milk. At the same time he was obliged to pay abnormally high prices for his feedstuffs. Cows not in good condition physically when they were turned out to grass in the spring indicated that some farmers had cut down on feeding. Other farmers were compelled to reduce the number of their cows, and many, very many, went out of business altogether. In view of all that has happened, it is easy to understand why there will be a summer milk shortage.

It is one of the curious manifestations of the made-to-order milk question that although the retail price of milk has increased in a smaller ratio than the price of almost every other food commodity, people always get provoked at an advance in milk prices and curse out the farmer and the dealer. When the price of milk goes down, as it does to the farmer for about six months in the year, it attracts absolutely no attention.

If the cities are to have milk enough to go around—and they must have it—there must be cows. If the farmer is going to keep cows he must get enough for his milk to make milk production possible.

It may interest you to know that on June 1, 1920, sixteen feed was quoted at \$81.20 a ton in carload lots for cash, f.o.b. any station. Just a year ago the quotation was \$62.20 a ton. All other feedstuffs have increased in the same proportion. The great shortage of farm labor gives the dairy farmer more anxiety even than feedstuffs.
