Dominion Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 14.

The Bill amending the Independence of Parliament Act was passed to-night after considerable debate, by a vote of 105 to 56.

Sir John explained the sections applying to the high commissioners, whose case they intend to meet. One plain common sense view of the subject is that the Independence of Parliament intended to prevent any person becoming a member of the Commons while he holds an office of emolument under the Crown, and second to compel any member to vacate his seat if he accepts any office for which emolument is paid by the Crown and must seek re-election. The spirit of the Act is the Independence of Parliament is to prevent the Government securing the vote of any person giving him an office of profit to himself. Sir Charles Tupper, being already a Minister of the Crown, could not be said to violate the spirit of the Act by accepting a post, the expenses connected with which are paid by the Government. It is perfectly allowable for a minister of the Crown to exchange offices and to take more than one office, the principle being the same in both cases.

Sir Charles was loudly cheered as he took his seat.

The resolution respecting the taking over of the Nova Scotia Railway was then moved by Sir Charles Tupper.

The Agricultural Committee this forenoon heard Mr. Stewart Thayne's opinion respecting the care of the forests of Canada. The Government should, in Mr. Thayne's opinion, set apart large tracts of land in each Province to preserve the forests, these tracts to be under the control of the Crown, and the revenue from the sale of the timber to be used for the benefit of the people. Such management of our forests would, he said, ensure labor in winter for men who would otherwise be unemployed, would ensure a continuous supply of timber to meet the requirements of the home and foreign trade, and would ensure the preservation of the value of the lakes and streams and to the benefit of the people. The Government should, he said, set apart large tracts of land in each Province to preserve the forests, these tracts to be under the control of the Crown, and the revenue from the sale of the timber to be used for the benefit of the people. 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
