The Icz Caor.—Ice-cutting operations in this vicinity have been discontinued for the season. The result is stated to be, that not more than from one-third to one-half a crop season. The result is stated to be, that not more than from one-third to one-half a crop has been housed, and that portion secured is generally of an inferior quality—lacking in thickness and solidity, and is consequently more perishable. Last year, the aggregate crop housed by the New-York Ice Companies somewhat exceeded 200,000 tons. This year, it will fall short of 100,000, which is the smallest for many years. The concern most largely engaged in the business, the Knickerhocker Ice Co., has secured this season, only about 25,000 tons against 100,000 last year. There is a proportionate falling off in other places. Baltimore has failed altogether, and Philadelphia is little better. In Boston, where there is usually an abundant supply for all purposes, the crop is decidedly short. We understand that the prices of ice next summer will be nearly double what they were last, or at least one-third larger; for instance, a large majority of families ordinarily receive ice at the rate of 25 cents per week; for the majority of tamilies ordinarily receive ice at the rate of 25 cents per week; for the same quantity it is supposed about 37½ cents will be charged, insomuch as, while the supply is diminished, a largely increased demand is anticipated.—New York Tribune.

McGLASHEN'S PATENT TRANSPLANTING APPARATUS.—The transplanting machine of Mr. McGlashen of Edinburgh, now well known to practical men in the east country, and for which he has received a first-class certificate of merit from the Caledonian Hastisubural Society was tested on the certificate of merit from the Caledonian Horticultural Society, was tested on the grounds of Mr. Campbell of Blythswood, in presence of a large party of ladies and gentlemen, and practical men. Mr. McGlashen having everything in readiness to proceed with the operation, a fine laurel, the branches of which were twelve feet in diameter was raised with the ball of the diameter, was raised with the ball of the carth, five feet seven inches square, and three feet deep, attached and placed on a truck for removal in less than a quarter of truck for removal in less than a quarter of an hour. The laurel, with the soil adhering to the root, was calculated to be between four and five tons in weight. The raising of the shrub vertically from its bed was accomplished with the greatest ease by the action of a screw turned by two men. The success of the operation was deemed highly satisfactory, and must have been very gratifying to Mr. McGlashen, the inventor The invention is applicable to all departments of gardening, and in its various forms can raise with the same facility the florist's flower and the largest tree. THE BOOMERANG SCREW .- In outline, the

Boomerang screw resembles the curious in-strument after which it is named, but its sweep is like that of a bird's wing, though there is no taper towards the end, the there is no taper towards the end, the breadth being nearly uniform. The advantages claimed for it are, a largly increased propelling power, and a freedom from any "choke" of water after leaving the fan, while its weight is very much less than that of propellers of like power now in use. These, of course, are great desiderata, especially in long voyages. To test the capabilities of the "Bounerang," the Genova, an iron-steamer, has been fitted up by Messrs. James Taylor and Co., Britannia iron works, Catheart-street, Birkenhead.
