Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The sum contributed by the Archbishop of Ottawa toward the Pope's jubilee fund is \$5,000, of which the city gave \$1,000.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—Sir John has been named as the representative of Canada to the Interprovincial Conference, on the ground that it would be for no purpose.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—Owing to the prevalence of Asiatic cholera in Italy and the Mediterranean ports the importation of goods into the Dominion from those regions is prohibited.

London, Oct. 7.—The Sultan of Morocco, who has been critically ill for some time, is dead. His six-year-old son took the oath of office on his father's corpse, assumed the government, appointing his favorite uncle Grand Vizier.

England has made a proposition to the Powers to all send men of war to Morocco to protect their respective subjects.

Ottawa, Oct. 7.—The revenue of Canada for the past three months of current fiscal year was \$7,077,000. The expenditure for the same period was \$6,827,000, leaving the handsomely surplus of \$250,000. The people of the State sympathize with Ayers. Governor Fitching, however, characterizes Ayers' action as an outrage upon the constitutional rights of the State.

Sofia, Oct. 9.—All the Government candidates have been elected. The results in the provinces are favorable to the Government. Election affairs in which blood was shed are reported at Vienna, Odessa, and Kharkov.

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Supreme Court.

The suit of Wisner and others vs. J. H. B. Call. On motion of Mr. Moron the Court grants a rule nisi against the defendant, to show cause why a writ of attachment should not be issued against him.

In re application of H. C. Shaw for admission to study in the office of Messrs. Macdonald, Moron & McQuarrie, on motion of Mr. F. Peters, the Court makes an order admitting the applicant to study law.

Richard Kofe, repellant, Benjamin Rogers, respondent. On motion of Mr. Moron for repellant, the court ordered this hearing to be postponed until next term.

J. G. Giffney vs. James Kibbick, an absent debtor. Mr. McQuarrie for plaintiff. Verdict given for \$522.01.

Sir Charles called at St. John's and interviewed the local Government there in reference to Newfoundland's position on the Commission and other matters pertaining to the welfare of that colony. It is understood that the subject of Federation was talked over unofficially.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Messrs. Putnam and Angell, who, with Secretary Bayard, represent this country in the negotiations between Great Britain and the United States, for the settlement of the fishery troubles arising under the treaty of 1818, arrived here yesterday and held a preliminary conference with Secretary Bayard. A mutual interchange of views and a general discussion of the subject of negotiations took place. Messrs. Putnam and Angell will remain here a few days in conference with the Secretary examining the voluminous official literature relating to the treaty.

New York, Oct. 10.—A child 18 months old died of cholera at Swinburn Island yesterday. This is the 17th death on the island, among the *Albatross* passengers, a total of 20 deaths in all.

LONDON, Oct. 10.—An immense meeting under the auspices of the National League was held on Sunday at the conference of the St. John and Barrow Rivers in Ireland. The water was covered with the boats and barges bearing the participants. The usual resolutions denouncing the course of the Government in Ireland were adopted. The police were completely outwitted, having no knowledge whatever of the meeting.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 10.—The election court sat at 9 p. m., having with consent of counsel, adjourned from 10 a. m. Judge McDonald presided. The adjournment was to enable the respondent, Sir Charles Tupper, to be present. The petitioner, Mr. Phipps, and Sir Charles were both present in court. Mr. Condon for the petitioner, stated that he had on September 27th received notice admitting bribery by agents of the respondent, Mr. Tupper. For the respondent, then made the same statement. Berlin, Oct. 11.—The alliance between Germany and Austria has been renewed for five years. Italy reserves the right to maintain an absolute neutrality in the event of a Franco-German war.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Oct. 11.—A steamer from New York, on its way to the board of health of Tampa, to-night, says "Evening advertiser," six new cases, one death to-day, several patients in a critical condition.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Edward Graham, who on August 12, last, threw a bomb in the face of Louis Riel, yesterday sentenced by the police magistrate to imprisonment for life. The court room was so packed that the judge's sentence was delivered there was vigorous applause. Graham, who is believed to be insane, never moved a muscle.
