**Poultry Association.**  
Last night another meeting of gentlemen interested in poultry raising was held in the Board of Trade Building. The meeting was presided over by Justice Emerson, and the committee appointed to draft a constitution and bye laws submitted their report. Mr. W. Barker was elected Secretary, and the rules and regulations submitted were adopted unanimously, without amendment. All are enthusiastic and feel the success of the organization which it is intended to incorporate. One thousand shares have been issued at \$1 per share, the amount to be also \$1. The committee were appointed provisional directors until the first annual meeting which will be held in October as possible after the preliminary work is completed. The object of the Association, as outlined in the constitution, is to encourage and promote the breeding of standard poultry and hold exhibitions of thorough-bred stock. Some 25 persons subscribed their names to the articles of the Association.

**Mr. Snazelle's Entertainment**  
Mr. Snazelle attracted a good audience to the Methodist College Hall last night. The features of the entertainment were the recitals of Mr. Snazelle and lantern pictures of the capital of the Empire. As an elocutionist he is natural, easy and masterly, and his rendering of "The Lovers of the Poor Bachelor," "Devil-may-care," "How Bill Adams Won the Battle of Waterloo," and "The Whistling Struwwelpeter" were much appreciated. His songs included "Arm, Arm, ye Brave," "The Road to Mandalay," "Drake's Dream" and "Simon the Cellarer."  
The second part of the entertainment was not so successful as the first. The pictures of the Sights of London were very good, and particularly the coloured slides of the upper reaches of the Thames. The lecturer complained at times of the voltage. This defecting was not so trying as the stowness of the manipulating of the slides, the casual manner of the lecturer, and the indifferent character of his remarks when the pictures were on the screen. The scheme of a pictorial lecture on the Heart of the Empire is good, the pictures are excellent, but the slide manipulation and the lecturer's rote leave much room for improvement.




