



The Naval Review.

Special Evening Telegram.

PORTSMOUTH, June 24. Never before has such an Armada been brought together for review by narrow waters of the Solent on this. the Navy's day, in the round of Coronation pageantry. Ranged parallel, and from 6 miles in length to 2 miles broad, floated 167 British and 18 foreign vessels, representing 17 nations. The aggregate tonnage of the British craft alone was over 1,000,000. As compared with this; little more than half the total was present at Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897. The value of the British ships represented an outlay of \$400,000,00 which, with the value of 18 foreign ships, placed the total expenditure \$500,000,000. 
