Pilot Boat and Fire Service

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Learning that the Pilot Commissioners contemplate purchasing another small steamer for the use of the pilots, permit me to respectfully suggest to the Commissioners not to proceed too hurriedly in the purchase of a tug—a little delay in so doing may prove beneficial to the water-side property holders, and particularly to the pilots. The men engaged in this hazardous calling are certainly entitled to better treatment at the hands of the Commissioners than to again be compelled to trust their lives in another cockleshell such as the "Ohio," especially as they annually contribute large amounts to a fund which is known as the "Pilot's Fund," which is reported to be now in the neighborhood of \$14,000. If I err in the amount mentioned I would be pleased if Chief Commissioner Capt. Ed English would correct me. What I suggest is: let a larger steamer be purchased by the Commissioners and then let a meeting be called of the five underwriters, the Municipal Council and Inspector General Sullivan to discuss the question of supplying the steamer with a first class fire apparatus, which could be at all times in readiness to cope with a conflagration on the water side. This would undoubtedly be a long felt want supplied. Therefore I think the time was never more opportune to supply a comfortable boat for the pilots out of the enormous fund at their disposal—the result of 40 years' service. Then let the underwriters and Municipal Council supply the necessary machinery, and a competent engineer to be paid by the body; and this accomplished, the high rates of insurance now levied on water-side premises can be materially reduced.

Music and Drama.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—It was not my intention to have any controversy concerning a Dramatic or Choral Society whatever, but I cannot allow a letter which I saw in your issue of yesterday, signed by "Choral," in answer to mine of one day previous, to go unchallenged. The writer, whom I am glad to see agrees with me on the idea of a Local Dramatic Co., has entirely misunderstood my letter. In the first place he says that I stated the fact of having started a small company—so far so good; but he also credits me with saying that I, lacking funds and support, had to stop. Now, Mr. Editor, this is utterly wrong and I am not aware of having made such a statement. If my friend would take the trouble of reading over my letter again, he would find these words: "I myself started a small company a short while ago, but lacking both funds and backers we are only able to cater to the public in a small way." Nothing at all about stopping; these words simply meaning that owing to the lack of money and the "silent partner" we are not eager to begin the T.A. thing and do the thing in the way which it should have been done. Our performances were paying, and we were greeted with full houses and were loudly praised by the daily press. So much for that.

"Choral" states that I said a Dramatic Co. was better than a Choral Society. Again I quote my own words: "It seems to me that not only do we want a Choral Society, but we also want a local Dramatic Co., and perhaps (not committing myself) the latter a great deal more than the former."

He also thinks that I have never heard a good Choral Society sing. Well, Mr. Editor, it might surprise "Choral" to hear that although I do not possess a voice of any remarkable size, I possess a seat in a city choir and perhaps in the "Hallelujah chorus," a beautiful and noble piece of work, which he speaks of, at the C. E. Cathedral and in the Methodist College Hall. So being so passionately fond of good music, I would not dare to put a Dramatic Co. before a good Choral Society. There was a Choral Society formed some time ago.

and for some reason, of which I do not know, it fell through. Now let some one with a thorough knowledge of theatrical work see what can be done with a good local Dramatic Co. There is plenty of room for both. Hoping my friend "Choral" understands my letter a little bit more, and thanking you for your valuable space, I am,

Theatricals.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I notice in your issue of yesterday a letter from "Citizen," re the promotion of a company for the purpose of bringing here from Canada or America a theatrical company to amuse the public in this line, instead of vaudeville and moving picture shows, and refers to the T. A. Hall as the only suitable for such purposes (thanks, friend "Citizen," for the compliment). But I would like to inform your correspondent, Mr. Editor, that the T. A. people have no idea at present of killing "the goose that lays the golden egg," if negotiations for the T. A. thing are not made here at a half dozen nights of the year by various local organizations. The total rental, as far as I can learn, on an average does not come to within a third of what the "Casino" management has paid and are prepared to pay for a full twelve months engagement.

The Executive of the T. A. & B. Society are not anxious to cater to the whims of a few of our money-making "citizens," when they have the interests of 500 men and thousands of boys who own the Theatre looming before them. The value of a rental to a "Nickle" company is more than might be imagined. At first thought, for instance, the valuable scenery and properties are not used and are liable to lose deterioration; secondly, the renovation, etc., of the theatre is done at other expense than that of the Society's; and, thirdly, the

lighting (by no means an unimportant item) is furnished by the lessees. When these facts are taken into consideration it will no doubt be apparent to "Citizen" and others why the Society is not anxious to lose the present rental in exchange for speculative visits from a fourth-rate theatrical troupe which hardly leave enough behind them to cover current expenses. These are the reasons why the T. A. Executive are not anxious to embrace too hurriedly suggestions from what might be aptly termed "Nippers."

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OTHER FIRES ON FRENCH SHIPS.

TOULON, To-day. Despite the opinion of naval officers, the rumor is confirmed that fires broke out on the Patrie and the Suffren on the same morning that the Liberte was destroyed. This adds to the general mystification.

Lieut. Garnier, temporarily command of the Liberte at the time of the explosion was asked by the junior officers some time before the final explosion in the magazines, whether they ought not to

be flooded. He told them to wait, apparently having in mind the fact that the Commander of the battleship, Brennus, had flooded his magazine when a fire was discovered near them four months ago, and later was secured by a Board of Inquiry for the premature flooding resulting in the destruction of ammunition worth \$40,000. When Garnier gave the order to flood the magazines, it was too late.
