### Man Hurt by an Explosion

The victim was picked up in an unconscious state, brought to his home where he was examined by Dr. Anderson. It was found that the young man's chest and arms were badly burned from the effects of the powder. What saved him from being blown to pieces was the fact that the powder was damp. The victim is being brought to Hospital to-day and it will be several weeks before his wounds are healed. The accident caused much regret at the lakeside when heard of as Harold Burt was a popular actor and was going to row in the Blue Peter in three races.

### Niagara Falls.

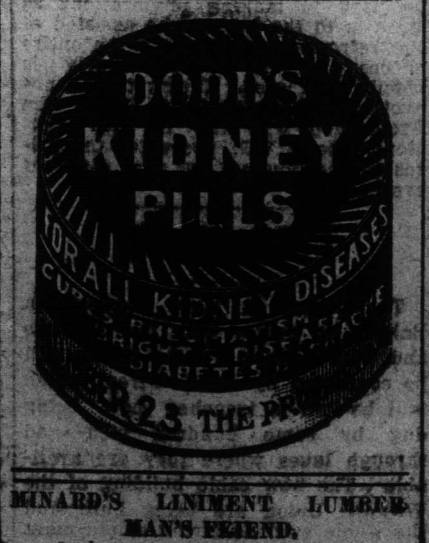
