SIGNING BEGINS.

WASHINGTON, To-Day. The signing of the Peace Treaty was begun at 10.30 o'clock. Washington time, says an official report to the State Department.

MANDATORY COMMITTEE.

PARIS, June 27. The Council of Four this afternoon appointed Lord Milner (Britain), Col. House (U.S.A.), M. Simon (France), Signor Crespi (Italy), and Viscount Chinda (Japan) as members of a Committee on Mandatories for colonies and territories detached from enemy Powers.

COMMANDER READ'S WELCOME HOME.

NEW YORK, June 27. An official welcome home, such as previously had been accorded only to returning Cabinet members, awaited Lieut. Commander Read, who commanded the first aircraft to cross the Atlantic Ocean, and his associates, Commander Towers and Lieut. Commander Bellinger, when they stepped ashore here to-day from the army transport Zeppelin. Both the officers and enlisted men were modest to the extreme in replying to the congratulations showered upon them. Commander Read thus expressed his appreciation of the reception: "We are glad to be home," he said; "we went on a seaplane and came back on a Zeppelin. They certainly treated us magnificent on the other side, and the British people gave us a royal reception. There is only one thing I regret regarding the entire affair, and that is that the undertaking was not a complete success, in that all three planes instead of one did not complete the journey."

CREDENTIALS APPROVED.

VERSAILLES, To-Day. The credentials of Dr. Hermann Muller and Dr. Johannes Bell, the German plenipotentiaries sent here to sign the Treaty of Peace, were approved this morning.

Mr. Dumond, of New York, caught first salmon at Fox Island River on the 23rd.
Week ending June 21st—2 salmon, Grand Bay Brook, 10 and 16 lbs. each; 27 salmon, Grand River, Codroy, 8 to 20 lbs. each; 12 salmon, Serpentine River, 6 to 21 lbs. each.
First salmon taken on S. E. River, Placentia, June 23rd.
First salmon seen Biscay Bay River, June 21st; none taken.
