## The Minister is Named.

A further development in the charge against a Minister of the Crown for having drawn cheques on the Treasury to pay his election expenses, the same to be charged to Pit Prop account, took place in the House last evening, when Mr. Walsh, member for Placentia, named the Minister and asked the Attorney General whether he intended to institute proceedings to determine whether the charge was correct or not. Mr. Walsh said he had seen the two cheques on which this accusation was founded, and they would be forthcoming as evidence as soon as the Minister of Justice required them.

Hon. Mr. Warren said that this was the first time that he had received anything in the nature of definite information, and that no one had been named in connection with the charge, which explained why he had up to this time taken no notice of what had been said in connection with it. He would do his duty, but this did not mean that he should be expected to go down to the Agricultural Department, as the Hon. Member suggested, and examine the Pit Prop accounts.

But the matter cannot rest here. The case has now reached a stage when it must be taken up and proceeded with. If the Minister is wrongfully accused, an investigation will exonerate him and if, on the other hand, the charge can be substantiated the Minister should be punished and no longer be allowed to act as a Minister of the Crown and a Legislative Councillor. It is common knowledge that in recent years there has grown up in the public life of the Colony a reckless indifference in the spending of public funds. There are laws on the Statute against such misconduct, but if they are not invoked and applied, it is only a mockery of justice to have them there. The public will, no doubt, watch with interest subsequent developments in this particular case with the confidence that these laws will apply equally as well to the rich as to the poor.

## The Labor Problem.

Whilst the labor situation in the city is being gradually solved and shows considerable improvement, there are many workmen still unable to find employment. A discussion of the subject in the House brought on by Sir Michael Cashin last evening revealed the fact that there were at least 300 families in the West End of the city in want of the ordinary necessities of life, because the bread-winners in these families were unable to get employment. Now that the Government has assumed the ownership of the Railway and the Dry Docks there should be a good deal of necessary and immediate repairs to be done in regard to improving these institutions. In the outports work has been recently started on inland roads to provide employment for the many men who could not get supplies to prosecute the fishery

this summer. This is commendable on the part of the Government, provided that the money is spent to advantage, on roads that will be useful to the public. A good deal of the expenditure is being made, we are informed, on new roads that will be of no general use to the public and for want of being used will become overgrown with alders a few years after they are constructed. If it be justifiable to spend large sums of money on such roads from the viewpoint of the Government, how much more so would it be to spend money on the roads on the Peninsula of Avalon, which are travelled by thousands of vehicles. Portions of the road around Conception Bay are badly in need of repair, and the Government would be doing a good deed in employing men to repair these roads. It is better to find work for the unemployed now than to have the needful duty handed over to the Commissioner of Charities next winter.

## In Passing.

The public is awaiting with keen interest to learn what action the Minister of Justice is going to take respecting the charge against Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines in the executive council; whom it is openly alleged willfully used the public funds of the colony to pay his personal election expenses.

The hair splitting methods already employed to avoid a proper investigation will not be tolerated, and it is to be hoped that British fair play will prevail in dealing with this alleged charge of misappropriation of public moneys.

The public safety and dignity of the Legislature is involved, as well as that of the constitution handed to us by the mother parliament which decrees that the unquestionable character and honesty of His Majesty's ministers and advisers must be above suspicion.

The public accounts up to end of June were submitted to the members of the opposition yesterday and in the course of time some revelations as to the expenditure of public funds will be made known.

It is to be hoped the government will be requested to table the accounts up to June 30th of this year together with the amounts listed under contingencies, which no doubt will prove very interesting to the taxpayers.

Readers will remember Hon. Mr. Coaker's trip to the West Indies which was thought to be of a private business nature; but according to the accounts rendered, the President of the P.P.U. drew from the Treasury only \$2,500.00 to pay his expenses. Sir William will probably explain what benefit the colony derived from this huge sum.

In 1921-22 Hon. Mr. Warren was paid \$6000 and Sir P. T. McGrath \$6950 for expenses in connection with the Labrador Boundary, these accounts are only "on account" and the full amount is not yet known but as another \$12,000 is voted in the estimates this year they will, no doubt, have a slice of this coming to them.

For the first time it is known that Judge Morris was a judge on the Labrador Coast for which service he was paid \$450.00 which was charged to the Labrador Boundary Account.

Hon. W. H. Cave, whose return for Bay de Verde District is being contested on the grounds of bribery and corruption, has presented a counter petition against Sir John Crosbie and Mr. Puddister.

The House meets this afternoon when the Address in Reply will be tabled and debated.

The Canadian Parliament was prorogued on Saturday last after a five month session.

The miners of Cape Breton and other mining countries downed tools on Tuesday in protest against the presence of Provincial and Federal troops in Sydney.

The resolution proposing the sympathetic strike action was brought in on behalf of the New Waterford sub-district, by W. J. MacKay, sub-district Board Member of the U. M. W. Speeches in support of it were made by MacKay, McLachlan, Tom Bell, Editor of the Maritime Labor Herald, and others.

There are fully 2,000 troops in the strike areas at present and it is quite evident that law and order has been restored.

The reported attempt to wreck the unit of the Besco work did not materialize and damage to the extent of many millions of dollars in consequence avoided.

The wrecking of the coke ovens would be disastrous to the miners as well as the corporation.

Up to time of writing no settlement has been arrived at and the general opinion of the Provincial newspapers, is that the strike will be of long duration owing to a falling market and lack of steel orders which was causing the company to lay off two thirds of the miners.

## TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

RAILWAY TRAGEDY.  
WELLINGTON, N. Z., July 6.  
Eight persons were killed and thirty-eight injured yesterday when the Auckland-Wellington express derailed near Taumarunui.

## FEAR LONDON STRIKE WILL SPREAD.

LONDON, July 6.  
Trade Union leaders, reaching Halifax yesterday, said that the dock strike which was further extended and now involves forty thousand workers in London, Manchester, Liverpool and Avonmouth. If the strike continues to spread, it is possible that other ports will be affected and fear exists among heads of unions that unless better council prevails, the strike may before long spread to other transport workers, particularly the railroad men who, for some time past have been in an aggressive mood, in fear that the companies may decrease further their wages.

## PRES. HARDING FOR ALASKA.

TACOMA, July 6.  
President Harding sailed for Alaska and is the first President to visit that territory. In an address before he sailed the President published correspondence between himself and the directors of the American Iron and Steel Institute. In his address he said, "A large majority of the steel manufacturers of America have undertaken to abolish the twelve hour day in American steel industries at the earliest moment that the additional labour required shall be available."

## JOINT SESSION OF MINERS.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., July 6.  
The anthracite miners and operators of Pennsylvania, representing one hundred and fifty-five thousand men will meet in a joint session here to-morrow to begin negotiations for a new wage contract to replace the present one, which expires on August 31st.
