This is a fateful day, and when this issue of the Telegram appears, the destiny of the country for the next four years will have been decided at the polls.



We understand that the authorities have the matter in hand. and that swift justice will be dealt out to those who are found guilty of producing or distributing these circulars.

We trust that when the perpetrators of this outrage are convicted that the sentences imposed upon them will be sufficiently severe to deter others from ever following their example.
