Rotary Club Luncheon

DR. ROBERTS' ADDRESS TO MEMBERS

Micro-Organism.

Little fleas have lesser fleas
Upon their legs to bite 'em;
And lesser fleas still have fleas
And so Ad Infinitum.

At the Rotary lunch yesterday, the following guests were present: viz: Rev. Chas. Leach; Doctors Macpherson, Knight, Brehm and Keegan, and M. E. T. De Beauregard French Consul. Dr. Roberts was the speaker. The luncheon was one of a series being held this month for the purpose of developing an active interest in

community health. Mayor Cook was in the chair.

The subject of Dr. Roberts' address was "Micro-organism." If any one expected a technical or statistical address under this heading they were disappointed or relieved, as the case may be, for the doctor made his subject fairly glow with interest as he showed, in popular language, how micro-organisms or germs enter into our everyday life for good or evil; or ganisms minute, ubiquitous, versatile, numerous in earth and water; living and moving and having their being about and around us; occupying every crevice in every organ, filling the mouth and nose and intestines; multiplying and dividing; so small that

the strongest microscopes are necessary to disclose their life, one hundred and fifty billion fitting standing room on a postage stamp turning best into wine and wine into vinegar; giving flavor to fruits, cheese and butter; helping to make our bread; combating many destructive agencies that would otherwise make life impossible. Moths have attacked a forest in the United States, a vote of one hundred thousand dollars was made to import microbes to destroy the moths and in this way the forest was saved. Such is micro-organism, benevolent and virulent, vicious and virtuous.

Micro-organism is the very basis and condition of our existence. Without them it would be impossible to grow a blade of grass and the earth would be entirely unproductive. They destroy dead, organic matter and they form nitrates for plants so that without bacteria or without decay there would be no plant food and consequently no animal food.

They have annihilated nations as in the case of the ancient Grecian state where the population was largely killed off by a disease due to Bacillus.

Although long suspected it was not until 1762 that the germ theory of disease was actually announced but even then the proof of the theory lacked the actual observation of the work of micro-organisms and it was not until 1820 when the microscope with its compound lens was invented that the micro-organism at its work was discovered in 1834 that the first of its kind was actually captured in destructive work on the silk-worm.

The first micro-organism respon-

sible for human disease found and discovered was the Anthrax Bacillus; then followed the discovery of numerous disease-producing organisms: In 1880 Malaria Fever; 1883 Typhoid; 1883 Tuberculosis; 1884 Cholera, etc. The speaker regarded the year 1853 which definitely discovered micro-organism, as the cause of human disease, the most important epoch in human history and the discovered as more worthy of honorable memory by monument or history or even the great statesmen of the world.

The discovery of the microscope revealed a world of minute animalcules more striking and important than even the discovery of the telescope which revealed solar and stellar systems.

Micro-organism of the virulent type wallows in dirt and filth, lives on feast on decaying tissues and dead and dying matter; increases daily at a rate beyond human comprehension and saturates the whole of our existence with their death-dealing venom.

Community health depends upon the degree to which these minute entities can be reduced. In St. John's we give them every encouragement with our filthy drains and streets, our rotting and decaying vegetables and animal matter exposed to their attack. Unsanitary houses abound; sewerage and decayed organic matter is available at every hand. While we are busy finding remedial measures for disease such as nursing, and hospital accommodation, we neglect the source of all disease and foster micro-organismic destructiveness on every hand.

The speaker acknowledged the courtesy of the officials at the City Hall who furnished him with a statement of the housing conditions, which he quoted and which showed that there are in the city 1039 houses without any sewerage and a large proportion of these are in such a dilapidated condition and so over-crowded that it is not possible to install sanitary appliances. A very striking improvement was made when the Council undertook to oil the streets of the city. Streets that are oiled can be easily washed and whole colonies of virulent, disease-producing germs, thus destroyed. This is the right end to begin upon and more can be done by cleaning up the streets than can be done by wholesale provision of remedies to deal with the disease after its development. In this direction the doctor pointed out, lay the Rotary programme for service. The sense of the public must be aroused to public cleanliness and it is in this direction that Rotary can do its best work.

There is no justification to-day for haphazard, spasmodic attempts; scientific knowledge in most instances is exact and dependable and all our efforts should be based on facts and the whole of facts, available.

One of the finest pieces of work that has ever been done for public health in this city was when the land around Windsor Lake was expropriated and the water protected from pollution. The man who was responsible for this act is more deserving of public recognition and honor than any who have won elections or made fortunes. No medical man now has any fear of Typhoid developing from our water supply.

In a similar way the whole environment of our community life needs protection from the destructive minute forces that abound and that run their riotous course about our lives without check or hindrance.

The speaker appealed to the Rotary Club to consider the needs of the case and lead the public in a crusade against dirt and disease in this city.

At the conclusion of his address a very hearty and enthusiastic vote of thanks was accorded the speaker and all felt that an address had been given which was full of much thought-provoking matter.

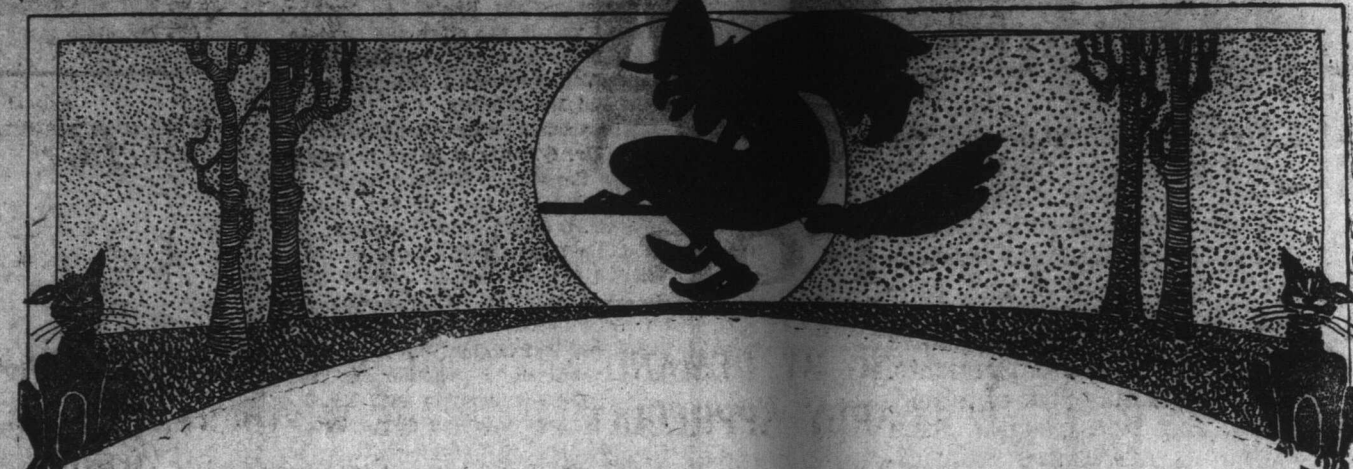
