The jast week has not beeen a very brisk one in our hone market, and farmers appear to be holding back, under the impression, that prices must advance during the summer—at all events, deliveries of all kinds of grain have been extremely light. Quotations have not varied greatly for the last few days—the great staples remaining at about the same figure, with the exception of a slight decline in Fall wheat. Provisions show a decided upward tendency. Little pork is coming in, and eggs are very scarce, probably being held back for Easter. They bring from 18 to 20 cents. Butter has gone up two or three cents on the pound, but very little of this useful commodity is to be seen. Hams are from 12 to 12 cents. Hacon from 11 to 12 cents. Mess Pork \$26. Lard 16 to 17 cents. European markets indicate further decline; and as our precent prices here are higher than the British markets warrant, prices at Guelph will in all probability come down, so that a margin may be left for exportation. Taking all things into consideration, we do not at present see anything to warrant the anticipation of an advance in price.
