NEW trial was ordered yesterday in the libel action between ex. Alderman Harry Minchin and Commissioner A. J. Samis. The trial will not likely be held till the fall as a jury will be needed. When the first trial was held in the earlier part of the year the charge was dismissed by Mr. Justice Simmons without being referred to the jury, on technical Mr. Justice Walsh who dissented.

The appeal in the Collard-Armstrong breach of promise case was yesterday formally dismissed by the supreme court with Mr. Justice Walsh dissented.

The judgment in the appeal was given by Mr. Justice Beck, and was concurred in by Chief. Justice Harvey, Judges Scott and Walsh.
