MANITOBA SCHOOL APPEAL CASE.

Mr. D'Alton McCarthy Gets Through—Argument Will Close Today.

OTTAWA, March 6.—There was a large attendance to hear the Manitoba school appeal case, which again came up in the railway committee room, House of Commons, this morning.

Mr. McCarthy, who again resumed his argument, covered a good deal of the same ground as he did yesterday. He explained what he meant by national schools, which were non-sectarian as compared with schools which were controlled under the church. He dealt at length with the greater efficiency of state schools as compared with the others, and read from the religious exercises used in the Manitoba schools to show that they were not Protestant schools, but of a non-sectarian character. He said that of all the provinces Quebec stood the lowest in respect to education. That was because the church had control of the schools.

The Cabinet rose at 1 o'clock.

Mr. D'Alton McCarthy closed his argument in the Manitoba school case this afternoon.

Mr. Ewart commenced to reply, dealing with the historical part of the argument until the Cabinet rose at 4:30 p.m. The argument will be closed tomorrow.

IMPORTANT DECISION

Affecting the Ownership of the Toronto Opera House.

[United Press Dispatch.]
TORONTO, March 6.—If C. A. Shaw, ex-manager of the Toronto Opera House, ever obtains a purchaseable interest in the theater, that interest was legally conveyed to his father-in-law, Samuel Perrin, the present owner, who resides in Detroit. That conveyance was made in March, 1887. Mr. Perrin claimed that it was made to perfect the title and rectify a mistake in the conveyance to him of the property by ex-Ald. Thos. Fells, its original owner. His son-in-law, he declared never had in any way interest in the property.

Mr. Shaw's father, Charles Shaw, of London, believed that his son had an interest in the property to the extent of \$20,000, and that he conveyed this interest to his father-in-law, "without consideration," and for the purpose of defrauding his creditors. Five months ago he brought suit against his son to set aside the conveyance on this ground for the purpose of realizing on a \$5,000 judgment he holds against his son for money loaned. His action was today dismissed with costs. Mr. Shaw, however, intends to appeal.
