New York, March 26 .- Edison, the inventor, succeeded on Friday in penetrating the human body with the naked He looked into the heart and lungs and examined the arteries, the blood vessels and muscles of one of his assistants, and in doing so achieved the crowning glory of his life by opening the door which at once revolutionizes and incalculably widens the hori-

zon of the medical world. With the powerful cathode rays behind his subject, he gazes through a screen of prepared chemicals and sees every organ of the body as plainly as one can see the dishes upon a dinner table. With the subject close to the light, nothing whatever is seen, but if the patient steps forward a foot or two from the light the skeleton is revealed. Still further from the light and the muscles, tissues and organs of the body appear as plainly as if they were not inclosed in flesh, as the distance from the light and the focus are changed. A fluorescent screen eight feet in height is now being constructed for Mr. Edison's experiments, and when this is completed he will be able to see from the top of the head to the sole of

Victoria, B. C., March 26.-The most violent climatic disturbances still prevail in the antipodes. A second heatwave sent the thermometer upward, the mercury climbing to a point never before reached. At Adelaide the temperature reached the highest point yet recorded, while at Melbourne deaths from heat, apoplexy and sunstroke have reached an alarming number.
