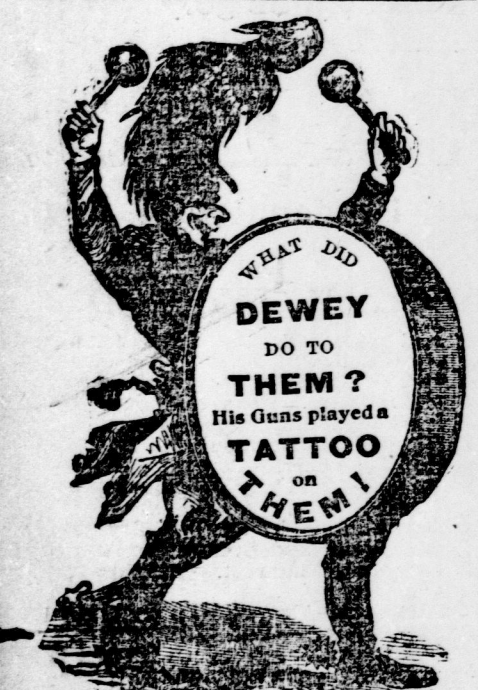

Toronto, June 24—11 p.m.—Pressure has continued to decrease over Canada, and it is now considerably below average everywhere except in British Columbia. Rain has fallen generally from the Rockies to Lake Superior, and a few local showers have occurred in the St. Lawrence valley. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Regimail, 52-64; Kamloops, 50-74; Calgary, 52-70; Qu'Appelle, 46-60; Winnipeg, 58-64; Port Arthur, 52-64; Parry Sound, 54-64; Toronto, 58-82; Ottawa, 54-86; Montreal, 62-74; Quebec, 56-74; Halifax, 50-72.

Probabilities: Toronto, June 25—1 a.m.—Lower lakes: Fresh to strong southerly to westerly winds; thunderstorms at many places and very warm; becoming cooler on Sunday, with some showers.

Local temperature: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory yesterday were 87 and 58 above.
