#### WITCHING FOR WATE

A SUGGESTED EXPLANATION OF 7 DIVINING ROD-

The New York Experiment Station of Reported Virtues-An Interesting Alts cle of a Scientifically Farming Tu-ti-The Corclusion Reached.

In the Practical Farmer of Philade phia, there appeared an article with the following title: "Witching for Water. Is there anything in it?"

I am of opinion that there is. It would appear that a belief so persistent is that in the efficacy of the divining rod, which has existed for centuries, and is at the present day firmly held by many persons of more than ordinary intelligence, which is moreover (unless authentic testimony be wholly disregarded) confirmed by practical results so ften repeated as to forbid the hypothesis of mere coincidence, is worthy of consideration, and ought not to be set aside as simply a delusion. While this belief has existed in many forms, and at the present is, by different individuals, and in different sections, held under widely-differing modifications, there appears to be a common ground of agreement, which regarding may enable us to reach an explanation of the reported virtues of the divining rod

First it will be observed that the charactor of the rod itself, its material substarce, its form, and the manner of holding it, varies widely, some insisting that it must be a forked branch of hazel, appe or peach. Each of these has its eariest advocates, while the more liberal minled grant that a branch of any tree beaing stone fruit will serve the purpos; others still regard a flexible steel or ion rod as superior to any other.

B some it is regarded as equally effectve for locating water or veins of mieral deposits, while others regarding it a valueless for one of these purposes. inst stoutly in regarding it as of inestimble value for the other, and generall we find its virtues extolled in differnt sections for the supposed ability it as to reveal that which is mainly desird by the inhabitants.

am not aware that the following explnation has been urged, and yet it sems to me so obvious that it must hge occurred to many who have sought toccount for some substantial reason fo a belief so persistently and so widely

hal. t is of course well known that one of th most common sources of the precius and other metals is in veins traveing the rocks, and which are often fand charged with workable ores probaly deposited along with the other mtters constituting the vein. It is also wll known that generally, if not indeed alays, these veins are not only differet in composition from the country rik in which they are found, but either hrder or softer than the adjacent rock, al therefore in the atmospheric action yon such rocks, the weathering, as it itermed, results in causing an elevatn or depression along the course of to vein, which often is quite marked. Many years ago I met a cultivated and intelligent mining engineer in one of our western mining districts, who, with all his general intelligence, was a firm believer in the divining rod, and used it also with marked success in pointing out new veins of ore. After a short course of observation, I became convinced that in this particular case the above explanation was ample, and to my friend's surprise he found that I, too, possessed this power, since in my hands also the rod turned as readily as in his own and, as he declared, as truth

fully. It would naturally happen that any local inequality on the surface would not likely be again struck in one's walk about, so that as a rule the existence of a change of level more or less continuous, such as a vein might cause, would soon reveal itself to one traversing it at intervals.-Peter Collier, in Country Gentleman.

America's Dead Sea. Medical Lake, so called on account of the remedial virtues of its waters, situated on the great Columbian plateau, in Southern Washington, at an altitude of 2,300 feet above the level of the Pacific, is the Dead Sea of America. It is about a mile long and from a half to threefourths of a mile in width, and with a maximum depth of about 60 feet. The composition of the waters of this Alpine lake is almost identical with that of the Dead Sea of Palestine, and, like its Oriental counterpart, no plant has yet been found growing in or near its edges. It is all but devoid of animal life, a species of large "boat bug," a queer little terra-Agent for Ballantyne's Creamery pin and the famous "walking fish" being its only inhabitants. This walking fish is an oddity really deserving of special note. It is from eight to nine inches long and has a finny membrane extending from head to head, even around both the upper and lower surface of the tail. It is provided with four legs, those before having four toes, the hinder five. - San Francisco Exam-

A WINDOW GARDEN.

How Best to Bring Plants Through the Canadian Winter.

Flower lovers are often discourage in the matter of growing house plan by the lack of a warm, convenient pl to keep them in at night. Neverthele in my earlier housekeeping days I ha considerable experience in maintaining a miniature conservatory in a room so cold that water would freeze there every severe night; and I found it possible to grow plants to perfection in just such windows, if the two following rules were observed:

1. The windows must be protected from all draughts of the cold outside air, that are so quick to find their way through every crack and cranny. Not only does an astonishing amount of frost creep in at these tiny openings, but the draught created makes the chill atmosphere act more quickly on the tender leaves and buds of house plants. Unless the door is air tight-and it rarely isthe carpet or oilcloth under the plant stand should be turned back, and a layer of newspapers, six or eight deep, placed beneath. The carpet when replaced will be as smooth as ever, if the papers have been spread evenly. Next the windowsash and woodwork need attention. Apertures of any considerable size can be stopped either by the patent rubber weather strips, or by common newspapers pressed into longitudinal folds the width of a knife blade, and made thick enough to fit snugly into the pace. Very small cracks and chinks tere best managed by pasting strips of spick paper over them. The plants in a ug, draughtless window will stand veral degrees more cold without insasry than those in windows with loose h and woodwork.

ht. To do this, take down all the from window shelves and brackets. make room for them on the plant star id, which, if on casters, can be ed out a little from the window. h a little experience one becomes as expe ert at packing as the typical Methodninister's wife is supposed to be, and can bunch together a great number of nts on a single small stand. Always nember to place the flowers most sceptible to cold on the top round, and e bushiest specimens at the corners of e stand. Always use newspapers for e first course of covering, and the arger and broader the papers the better. Paper is more impervious to the air than cloth, and if properly distributed will scarcely bend a leaf of the plants beneath them. The same papers can be used again and again, and except in the coldest weather are all the protection needed. In exceedingly low temperature sheets or blankets should be pinned around the stand, first making sure that the inner covering of newspapers is unusually thick so that the plants will not be crushed by the weight of the blankets. Do not uncover in the morning until the room has become

In severe weather cover plants at

genially warm. I have carried coleus, heliotrope, begonias, and other plants as tender as these safely through the hardest winters. One is well repaid for the trouble by possession of bud and bloom that make summer-like the dreariest winter.—Lora
