LIMITED EXPRESS CRASHES

INTO AN EXCURSION PARTY

Detroit the Scene of an Awful Catastrophe.

EIGHT KILLED; SCORES INJURED

Excursionists Were Standing Upon the Tracks When Flyer Dashed Into Crowd.

Detroit, Mich., May 4.—A day of merry-making and celebration by 1,500 Polish excursionists from Toledo was brought to a close by a frightful catastrophe at 8:30 o'clock last evening, in which at least eight of the excursionists were killed.

Those so far known to be killed are: Walter Shwilk, Toledo, carpenter; Frank Rosenfeld, Toledo, unknown boy, about 9 years of age, light hair, blue eyes, dressed in dark blue; unknown woman, about 23 years of age, light hair, marriage ring on hand; unknown man, body and clothes badly mangled, apparently a Pole; unknown boy, died at Grace Hospital.

A partial list of the injured gives the number at 22. Two children are missing.

The excursion was given by the Polish Lancers, of Toledo, over the Lake Shore Railway. They left the train in the morning at the corner mentioned, and were met by a number of local Polish societies, who escorted the visitors to St. Joseph's Church. An entertainment was held later at Harmon Hall.

Last evening the visitors began to gather again at the place of embarkation to take their train back to Toledo. Both the Lake Shore and Grand Trunk tracks run out from the Brush street station on Dequinder street. Four policemen stood at the corner and endeavored to keep the excursionists from crowding through the gates onto the tracks. Despite their efforts, hundreds walked under or over the gates and crawled down the dark tracks to await the arrival of their train, which could be seen coming slowly up from the station. Probably 1,000 persons were scattered along the tracks, and the crowd was given to the board the excursion train and secure seats.

Suddenly, from out of the darkness, came the Grand Trunk Chicago and New York express, known as the Pan-American flyer. It plowed through the mass of people, throwing them to both sides of the track, bruised and maimed, some into the air, and grinding a number of them under the wheels.

Patrolman Frederick T. Schultz, John Zynda, a prominent local Pole, and a number of others who were at the crossing, assert that the flyer's whistle was not blown, nor was the bell rung. No statement could be secured on this subject at the local Grand Trunk offices tonight.

The flyer was stopped as quickly as possible and backed to the scene of the catastrophe, where for two blocks the track was covered with wounded and dying people. Four of the dead were killed outright, and four of the others died after being taken to the hospital.

The tracks are very dark below Canfield street, and lanterns had to be brought into use to find all the victims. A neighboring coal office, several neighboring houses and the gateman's shanty at the crossing were made into temporary hospitals, and the wounded were carried into them until ambulances arrived a few minutes later. Every ambulance in the city was called out, and the injured were very soon under the care of surgeons in the hospital.

Patrolman Schultz, who was one of the officers on duty at the crossing, said: "We made every effort to keep the people off the tracks, but it was impossible. There were 1,500 excursionists going back to Toledo and twice that number of local Poles, who had been entertaining them, were down to the crossing to see them off. Those behind pushed and shoved the foremost ones, and they crawled under the gates, which were closed properly, or jumped over them, despite our best efforts. There was no warning whatever of the approaching Grand Trunk train. The bell was not blown, and I should think that 1,000 was a small number for the people who were on the tracks for two blocks, trying to be among the first aboard the Lake Shore train, and thereby secure seats for the homeward trip. The Grand Trunk train came out of the darkness like a meteor, and was into the crowd almost before I realized what had happened. A terrible cry went up from those who had witnessed the accident, and rescuers swarmed down the track. The cries and groans from the injured guided us in the darkness, and we picked them up from both sides of the track for two blocks. Some of the sights were too sickening to describe."

George Bardellis, the aged gateman at the Canfield crossing, insisted that his gates were down properly.

The crowd of the flyer as given to the police were: Conductor, E. L. Higson; engineer, J. Horx and Fireman Carl Butler. No statement could be secured from the engineer or fireman as to the assertions of bystanders that the whistle was not blown for the crossing.

Detroit, May 4.—Engineer Thomas H. Hart, of the Pan-American flyer, on the Grand Trunk, hurriedly ran through a crowd on a crossing here last night and caused the death of at least seven persons and the injury of more than a score, said today where the accident occurred is not a regular stopping point for incoming passenger trains, and unless the engineer receives notice before reaching the crossing he has the signal turned against him, he run through without stopping.

"We were running down on time last night, and when we neared Canfield avenue I noticed the headlight of the Lake Shore train standing at Canfield avenue; but, as this is a common occurrence, I paid no attention to it. The light from the other engine was shining in my eyes and it was impossible for me to see the crowd on the track until I passed the other engine."

"When I first noticed the crowd the people were scattered all over the track and, after blowing the whistle, I applied the brakes, but could not stop my train in time to prevent running into them. We were running about twelve miles an hour, the usual speed at that place, and it was impossible for me to bring my train to a stop in the short distance between my train and the crowd."
