ment Aid to the Western
University at Convo-
cation Yesterday.

CITIZENS ARE THANKED

For the Hearty Support They Gave to
the Students of the Western
Medical College.

The twenty-eighth annual convocation of the graduates of the Western Medical School was held in the Auditorium yesterday afternoon. There was a very large crowd of citizens in attendance to witness the ceremonies, and the presentation of the diplomas and medals.

Dr. Moorhouse presided, and with him on the platform were Dr. Waugh, Dr. James of the Western University, Dr. Ferguson, Dr. Seaborn, Dr. McCallum, Dr. Eccles, Dr. Hadley Williams, Ernest Williams and Rev. J. Gibson Inkster.

In his address Dr. Moorhouse outlined the growth of the Medical School, and spoke of the changes of the past three years, which have made it an entirely unrecognizable college.

"The Western University," "we have asked Sir James Whittemore to do something to put the Western University on a firm footing. In order to make a university a success it takes funds. So far the provincial treasury has been absolutely closed to us. The east has its university. The west has none, and yet it is here that the great part of the population of the province is located. Queen's University at Kingston is Sir James Whittemore's alma mater. It has been given very substantial financial assistance. It is true that we in London have had a hygienic institute erected here. But it is standing idle, and is of no use to us. The Medical School has not the funds to run an institution like that. It is for the public benefit, and consequently we think that the province should support it. Statistics show that it takes \$130 per annum to educate a student at Toronto University. All we are asking for is for the Government to allow us \$75 per student."

The valedictory address read by Dr. George Ramsay, was one of the best ever read at a local convocation, and was listened to with keen interest by all.

"The sands in the hour glass have run quickly," he said, "and the four years of our college life have passed away, and now we have reached the goal for which we aimed. This is, however, only the starting point in our career. We must fight the battle alone in future, not as children, but as men in a world of men. In parting I would like to thank the citizens of London for the hearty support and encouragement they have always given us, and for the many kindnesses they have shown us. It is in your midst that we have tasted the joys of our pleasure and profit, and now tomorrow we go out into the world for ourselves to face life and all that the future has in store for us."

Secure a University.
"We congratulate the stand you are taking to secure a university in the west. Its presence in your midst will make for culture and all that that implies."

"We wish to thank the faculty and the physicians in general, the hospital authorities and the asylum officials, for the many courtesies they have extended to us in the course of our work, and I assure them that we appreciate it."

In concluding the valedictory, a strong appeal was made for clinics, and some suggestions regarding the course at the school were also included.

The Reply.
The reply to the valedictory was made by Dr. Seaborn.

"Thank you for the kind remarks you have made regarding what we have done," he said. "We have tried to do our best for you while you have been here. The measure of your future success depends upon your earnestness. You must continue to work. The honors of the medical profession are bought by great trial. There can be no greater punishment for you than to know that because you have not done your best some human being has suffered or even lost his life. Always be true to your conscience."

Rev. Mr. Inkster.
Rev. J. Gibson Inkster gave the graduates an address that was short, but was listened to with much interest.

"Don't stay out late at night," he said. "Get a wife as soon as possible. There is no joke, as you will discover after you get her. There are a great many young men who are foolish enough to imagine that they must first have a fine prairie, an elegant motor car, and a fine home to bring their wives to. That is a mistake. Your wife will be happier if she shares your sorrows with you as well as your joys."

Doctors and ministers should work together more. They should work hand in hand. If they did there would be fewer Christian Scientists."

The oath was administered to the students by Dr. Ferguson and Dr. Waugh presented them with their diplomas. Dr. Moorhouse presented the gold medal to W. H. McFarlane and the silver medal to E. G. Butterworth.

A RIVAL TO COBALT?

Danford Lake, North of Ottawa, Said
to Be Rich in Gold.

Ottawa, May 2.—The little village of Danford Lake, situated about six miles west of Kazabazua, Que., is at the present time the centre of great excitement over mineral finds, which are alleged to have been made in the district during the past few weeks, and which the people for miles around believe to be very important.

The majority of the residents of the district are firm in their belief that Danford Lake is destined to become a gold and silver producing camp that will prove a rival of either Cobalt or Porcupine.

To the farmer the tangle of the cow-bell is no longer music, and the sheep bleat in the distant pastures unheard. The prevailing spirit of optimism has caused him to forget for a time the source from which his living comes, and his ear is alert for the pounding of stamp mills.

It is estimated that an area of over 40 square miles has been staked, and that at least 500 men are at work prospecting and developing. Even a large portion of the Kazabazua Plains have been staked.

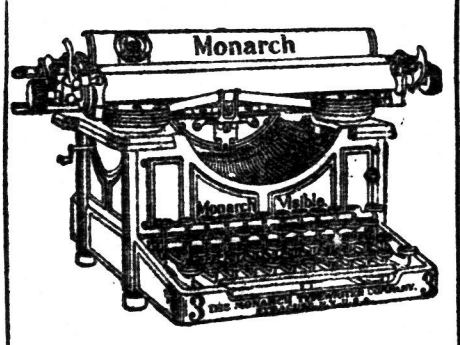
DAMAGED BY RAIN.
