Stock Yards, the Easter demand is being felt on the market now, and sales prices are good, while sheep, lambs and hogs are scarce, and prices steady. Export cattle are almost equal to the demand, and are steady at last week's prices. Common butcher cattle are not in as strong demand as all last week, and in many cases prices are not holding as strong, but the good and choice butchers are in very strong demand with strong prices. A few loads of very fancy butchers for the Easter trade sold at from \$7 to \$7.50, while the more common stuff ranged at from \$6.50 to \$7; butcher cows remain about steady, with a fair offering. Feeding steers and stockers are selling at good prices with a few loads of good to choice offerings. Sheep and lambs are decidedly scarce, although prices are not greatly changed. Hogs have taken another slight advance, but are not too plentiful. Receipts show 124 cars, consisting of 2,690 cattle, 60 calves, 454 hogs, and 31 sheep and lambs.

Room for Five Thousand Farmers.

Wheatley Journal: "The London Advertiser is publishing a series of articles, written by a special commissioner who has been over the ground, showing the advantages of living in Western Ontario, and these articles are creating considerable favorable comment. The tendency of the Ontario farmer for the past few years has been to sell out and go West. 'Foreign hills look green,' and the stories of the rapid rise in fortune of those who have lived there a few years, has no doubt had much to do with this exodus. They do not stop to consider that most of the fortunes have been made by land speculation—a few of them have realized the hardships to which they will be subjected in that country. The West has been largely advertised, which accounts in a great measure for the great influx of settlers.

The purpose of The Advertiser's campaign is to show to the Ontario farmers that as much money can be made in this western peninsula on a 25-acre farm, by using proper intensive methods of cultivation, as can be made from a quarter section in the West by the methods employed there. And while they are doing it, they can still enjoy the comforts of life to which they have been accustomed.

"This part of Ontario has often been referred to as the Garden of Canada, and it is no empty title, but it would appear that the people of this section are just beginning to realize the possibilities of their heritage, and are now using it to the best advantage. The influx of American farmers and the activities of the British Cannery has done much to stir things up and increase the value of the land. With the establishing of canning factories a good market close at hand is assured, and returns as high as from \$300 to \$500 per acre have been received from the growing of tomatoes and cucumbers, and even as high as \$1,000 per acre has been realized by specializing in early varieties of tomatoes, by getting them to the market a week or so in advance of the regular season.

"While early vegetables undoubtedly yield the largest returns, considerable capital and expert knowledge of horticulture is necessary to succeed in this branch of the business. The man with limited means and but little experience stands a much better chance by operating his farm mainly as tobacco or corn land and devoting a few acres to tomatoes as a side line. There is plenty of room for 5,000 more farmers between St. Thomas and Windsor, and a properly directed publicity campaign will surely bring them as it has to Western Canada."

MADAME CURIE BETTER.—Will Engage in Conference To Fix a Radium Standard. [Canadian Press.] London, March 25.—The London Times has this dispatch from its Paris correspondent: "Mme. Curie, who has been ill for some time, and upon whom it was found necessary to perform an operation, is now much better, and it is hoped she will be sufficiently recovered to take part in the forthcoming deliberations of the International Commission for fixing a radium standard."

"At the request of the commission she prepared a glass tube three millimetres in length, and the exact amount of radium contained in this tube will be fixed as the standard of weight. The tube will be sealed at both ends, but a small platinum wire will allow the constant passage of an electric current, which will prevent the radium rays from breaking the glass."

TURN COAL INTO GAS IN BOWELS OF EARTH

Sir William Ramsay Expects To See Coal Mining Done Away With.

[Canadian Press.] London, March 25.—Sir William Ramsay, speaking at the opening luncheon of the smoke abatement exhibition, held out the prospect of doing away altogether with coal smoke and coal mining by turning coal into gas in retorts in the bowels of the earth. He could conceive the possibility, he said, of sinking the quantity of oxygen necessary to burn to the required extent the coal where it was, and drawing off the gas thus generated, to be used for producing at the pit head electric power, which could be distributed from there.

The coal miners should carefully consider what they were doing at the present moment, or they might find their business gone from them. Sir William thought there was no reason why much of the electricity should be manufactured at a cost of a hundred units for a penny.

RIDGETOWN LAD WAS TERRIBLY INJURED

Allan Jefferies Was Drawn Into Machinery While Playing In Mill.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ridgetown, March 25.—A very serious accident occurred at the big flour mill here, when Allan Jefferies, aged 8, son of Mr. Samuel Jefferies, grocer, while playing about the mill, slipped into an opening leading the chute which feeds the corn sheller. Miss Bert Leitch, the bookkeeper, happened to witness the affair, and ran at once to the engineer and notified him. The engine was at once shut down, and the machinery stopped, but the unfortunate boy was pinned in the machinery of the sheller, part of which had to be taken out before he could be removed.

He was taken home at once, and Dr. Groves summoned, when it was found that one leg was broken in two places, and his body badly bruised. While he sustained a severe crushing, it is hoped there are no serious internal injuries.

FORTY-SIX WANTED TO BE POSTMASTER

MACHINERY NOT UP TO REQUIRED STANDARD

Prof. Angus' Report on Horton Street Wells Is Made Public.

The report of Prof. Angus, of the University of Toronto, on the Horton street plant, has been made public, and it shows that the compressors are not up to the required efficiency. The pumps are rather bad in workmanship, and are not as efficient as the agreement demands, the report says.

The firms supplying the machinery warranted them last year, but they have done nothing towards making the accuracy of the figures of Prof. Angus, and may possibly demand another expert before they will do any work. In the meantime, \$5,000 is held back on the contracts.

The volumetric efficiency of the compressors, after repeated tests, was found to be 78 per cent. The capacity of the compressors was only 85 per cent of the guaranteed amount at high pressure, and much less, about 60 per cent, when the lower pressure is put on.

The compressor operated by the gas engine shows 86 per cent of efficiency. The motors in all cases were up to efficiency.

The pumps manufactured by the McDougall Company, of Montreal, did not live up to the contract, it is alleged. The fact that the compressors are not up to the standard of efficiency decreases the volume of water from the wells, as the quantity pumped depends altogether on the amount of air furnished. The wells were found to be in good condition. The building was suitable and everything in connection with the place was up-to-date in every respect.

Mr. Glauzitz Speaks. "The report shows that the compressors are not up to volumetric efficiency, and the pumps not mechanically efficient, as required by the specifications," said General Manager Glauzitz. "These facts I brought out some time ago, when the report was first submitted. The contractors were asked to put them in condition, and so far have not done so. A considerable portion of their contract money is held back, and it will not be paid out until such a time as the machinery is made to comply with the conditions laid down. The defects are not so very serious, but we want the machinery in perfect condition when we accept."

"The contractors must live up to specifications," said Mr. Pocock, chairman of the board. "This they are not doing, according to Prof. Angus' report, and they will have to be made to do so. Objection was made to some features of Mr. Angus' report, but as he is an independent expert engaged for the purpose, we will have to submit to his judgment, and so will the contractors."

LONDONER TELLS OF BLOODY FIGHT

Dr. Wallace Crawford, a Missionary, Tell of the Horrors Going On In China.

A FIELD OF CORPSES

Party Came Along at Night After a Fierce Battle and the Sight Was Sickening.

Dr. Wallace Crawford, son of Mr. L. W. Crawford, of this city, and a well-known missionary to China, writes home as follows under date of Feb. 11:

Han Hsu Chow, An Hui Province, Shanghai, Feb. 11, 1912.

"I left Shanghai two weeks ago, and came to Nanking, where I was met by one Dr. Brown, who came up the line with me. We made a day's journey on the train and got to the advance post of the Red Cross work. That evening we heard that another train was going further in so we determined to go along. We found an empty steel car and got in, spread our blankets amid the roar of the engine and the cars were swept up towards the firing line. We arrived at the advance station at about 2 a.m., and found the army was advancing, so we called on the general and asked for a special car, which he gave us, and we prepared to accompany the troops to the firing line.

An Accident. "We were in the midst of preparing breakfast (at 11 a.m.), when the soup was rudely sent all over the car and all over some of the boys, spilling two of them, and giving the rest of us a scare. We will not forget. Upon examination we found two cars in the ditch and one half way there. Fortunately no one was hurt, and I proceeded to clear the track. But I did not reckon that we were in China, and when it came to such a thing as moving a car, why that was past anything but a locomotive. However, I got them to do a little work, but not enough to clear the track. Our engine said that we had to move the car in the ditch, but I asked him to try, and he did, and to his surprise he pulled the thing on to the track. However, I could not get them to continue, so they stayed there for nearly a week, and I assured them that we could clear it in three hours, and we could have had them as game as I was.

"Well, we hung around there all the next day awaiting for them to clear the line and part of the next, and at that time got tired of doing nothing so got the crowd to go up the line. We heard that there was fighting 25 miles away, but that was past the crowd, and they did not think of going. I said, however, we decided to move our car, and as far as we could, and after tossing a dollar it was my lot to go along with a Dr. Hardy from West China. We started out, and he was a good fellow, and we went on, and we found out the makings of a hand-car and got four men to run it, put our goods on it and started out, for where, we knew not.

They were different from the Republican soldiers, and we decided that they belonged to the Imperialists. The mutilated man also told the tale of battle.

"We went along about two miles more, passing other corpses, and then we saw the outline of the city wall. We found out the Imperialists were on either side and had come to the scene of the battle without a living man anywhere. We kept on watching in case a rifle might pop in our direction and got to the station, when we found out the Imperialists had thrown in railway cars fifty miles up the line, leaving the Republicans in full possession. We went over to what we thought might be the railway hospital, and there found dead, dying and mangled everywhere. The picture in the moonlight is better imagined than described. After a consultation it was decided that the best thing that we could do was to go back to the Imperialist car and get our tools. Fortunately we secured a trolley car and five men to work it, and at midnight we started back to the car on the trolley, with 25 miles to make.
