Three Have Appendicitis.

DRILL FOR OIL.

Another Rich Find May Be Made at
Oil Springs.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
Oil Springs, Sept. 12.—In an effort
to find a fine flowing oil well drillers
are working here, and plan to go to
the Trenton graptolite, which is about
3,175 feet down. Some years ago a
deep well was drilled in Petrolia, but
no oil was located. It is thought
that the drillers will find a good oil
or gas field above the salt bed at the
1,200-foot level. Should oil be located
another boom will take place at the
Springs. The last big find in this
field was 25 years ago, when oil was
found at the 600-foot level.

GREAT BATTLE FOR THE BIG RED TICKETS

Cattle Exhibit One of the Finest Ever Brought Together—
Large Exhibitors Sweep Most of
the Classes.

The Western Fair is noted for its
fine cattle display, and this year is no
exception to the rule.

All the various breeds are repre-
sented. The quality is much above
the average, and the number of ani-
mals shown compares favorably with
any exhibition of the kind in America.
Capt. T. E. Robson, chairman of the
cattle committee, is anxious to make
this department a success, and he has
accomplished his purpose.

Western Ontario is in the heart of
the dairy industry, and it was to be
expected that this breed would com-
mand attention. This is the case, par-
ticularly with Holsteins. This fine
breed is popular with the farmers, and
as a result three of the best herds in
Canada are being shown.

They are those of A. Hulet, Nor-
wich; G. S. Gooderham, Bedford Park,
and Haley Bros., of Springfield. Mr.
Gooderham was a large share of the
prizes, but the other exhibitors all got
a share. The herds are long on milk
records, and there is not a bad indi-
vidual in the lot. Mr. Gooderham is
particularly pleased with the Western
Fair, declaring it to be one of the
finest exhibitions in Canada.

Mr. Bull Wins in Jerseys.
In Jersey, H. J. Bull, Brampton,
has everything his own way. He has
a large entry list, all of the animals

being of first quality, and splendid in-
dividuals.

In Ayrshires, the prizes are about
equally distributed between Alex.
Hume & Co., Menle, and W. Stewart
& Sons, from the same place. These
exhibitors have everything their own
way, and outsiders had no chance.
In the beef breeds, there are many
entries, with keen competition. In
the Aberdeen Angus, J. Bowman, of
Guelph, and Thomas Broadfoot, of
Fergus, swept the boards. Each gen-
tleman has an excellent collection of
the finest quality of animals, and they
simply distribute the prizes among
themselves.

The Hereford classes furnish the
keenest of competition. Three breed-
ers, L. Clifford, Oshawa; H. Dealey
Smith, Hamilton, and Thos. Skippen,
Hyde Park, went after the ribbons,
and it is hard to say which won the
majority.

Sweeps All Classes.
In the Galloways, A. O'Neill & Sons,
Burr, swept all the classes. There was
no competition. The individuals are
excellent.

In the Shorthorn classes there was a
fight for every ribbon. When such ex-
hibitors as Fairbairn, Theftford; Rob-
son Bros., Iderton; Mellech, of Ed-
monton, and several others meet, there
is certain to be a battle. The ribbons
are very widely distributed. On the
whole, the cattle exhibit is a good one,
the equal of any in recent years.

LIKE AN ORIENTAL GARDEN IS THE BIG FLORAL SHOW

Riot of Color in the Horticulture Building With Vivid
Crimsons and Delicate-Toned Blossoms.

The floral display in the horticultural
hall at the Western Fair rivals in beauty
and variety the exhibit of any previous
year. To see the display at its best, the
Fair visitor should really have made a
point of this exhibit, for the last days
of the exhibition, as the sultry
weather of Monday and Tuesday proved
other new departure in the dahlia family
is the single dahlia, which reminds one
somewhat of an enlarged petalium. It
possesses beauty of its own, but is rather
plain when compared to the other varie-
ties mentioned.

Three of the Winners.
Charles Baker has a fine display of an-
nuals, and for the best exhibit of annuals,
perennials and shrubs, A. C. Johnston,
of Tambling's Corners, is the successful
grower. In the potted plant section, J.
Gammage & Sons' beautiful exhibit of
ferns, palms and other beauties occupy a
central position and elicit much admira-
tion. The showing of begonias in bloom
is also exceptionally good.

The visitor could pause long before
the cut flower table, which is garnished
by floral designs of nearly every de-
scription, including bridal bouquets and
wedding favors, funeral wreaths, etc.
Roses, Madonnas, lilies, delicate
tinted asters and lilies of the valley, with
of various colors, are combined in
many a pleasing effect.

Among those showing, both professional
and amateur, were Mr. J. H. Roberts,
Stratford; T. H. Hill, Richard Fletcher;
W. H. F. Bartlett, Samuel Scott, W.
C. Baker, A. C. Johnston, Tambling's
Corners, and many others.

WESTERN ONTARIO PROUD OF AGRICULTURAL SHOW

The Agricultural Building at the
Western Fair should be and is educa-
tional. The various displays of
fruits, grains and vegetables, taste-
fully arranged on the long counters,
form an exhibit which is seldom
seen. When one examines it is sure
to hear the stamp of appreciation. To
the children it is of unfailing inter-
est, and they glory in viewing the
immense vegetables and delicious
fruits just as much as though they
are passing through some fairland.

Adults have more practical feelings
and are equally enthusiastic over the
different displays, the product of
many hours of care and toil on the
part of the agriculturalist. It is not
an uncommon thing to observe farm-
ers comparing the prize products on
exhibition to those which they have
raised on the back of their own hands.

And sometimes they are positive
that the quality raised on the dear
old farm surpasses any shown in the
building, but as a rule they are
pleased and pay respects to the fine
display.

Best for Years.
According to Mr. John Beaton, who
has been the guard in this building
for several years, the present agricul-
tural display this Fair is the best for
some years, both as to quality and
quantity. The only fault is that some
of the fruits mature very rapidly in
the warm weather and soon decay. In
the centre tables the general display
of vegetables catches the eye. Here
are some cabbages which boast a
diameter of forty-four inches;
squashes of every shape and variety
ever existing, not to mention some
which never previously had existence;
tomatoes which remind one of the
quality only known to grow in Eng-
lish gardens, in addition to carrots,
beets, parsnips, and as the rural auc-

tion sale bill would say, "Other arti-
cles too numerous to mention."

At the west end of the Agricul-
tural Building is an exhibit, not ex-
hibited for the sake of obtaining
prize money, but merely to demon-
strate what is capable of being done
at an institution. Besides it is un-
usually unique and is a great draw-
ing to the children. The exhibit of the

the opinion of many there is nothing
to equal this display on the grounds.

The "mammals show skill and ex-
cellence in the quality of the goods
shown. The exhibit includes hand-
made clothing, a display of preserved
and raw fruit, baking, cement tiling
and all kinds of grain and vegetables
grown on the farm. On Mon-
day the inmates had the pleasure of
viewing their own work, and they
were greatly pleased to say the least.

Some Special Exhibits.
Other exhibits demanding attention
belong to the C. J. R. J. H. Roberts,
next to the Asylum display. The Lon-
don branch of the Ontario Vegetable
Growers. In the southwest corner,
these all have an artistic display of
their wares, and indeed, would be
difficult to surpass.

Along the west side of the Horti-
cultural Hall is the display of large
cucumbers, some of Ontario's choicest.
On one of the counters a special design
is worked out in apples, "Lambton
for Fruit," and one does receive the
impression that Lambton is unequal-
led when it comes to orchard grow-
ing.

After a thorough review of the
various displays of fruits, grains,
vegetables, etc., throughout the build-
ing, one is impressed more than
ever that Ontario is good enough for
the Ontario farmer, and that the
"Stay in Ontario" campaign should be
advanced amongst all classes with
greater zeal than ever.

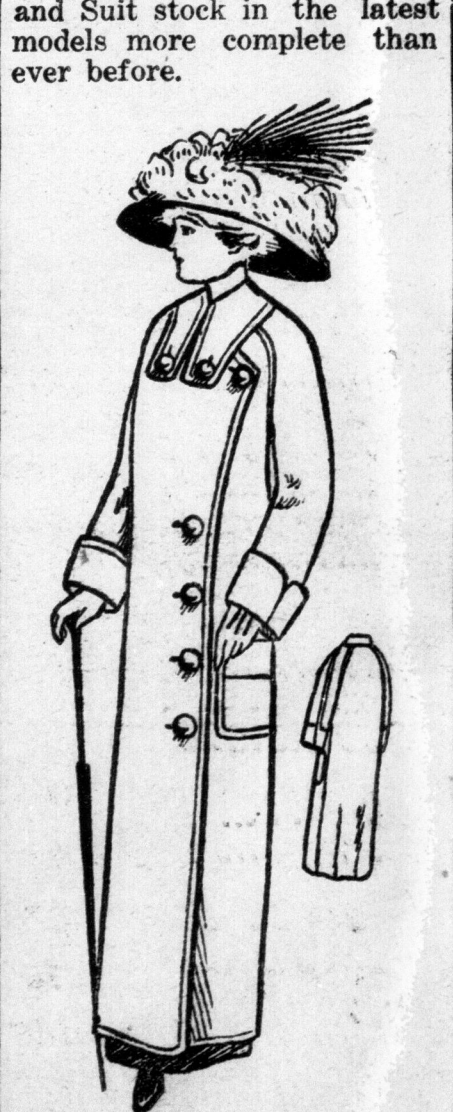
