

LATE DAVID COWAN'S WILL DISPOSES OF **ESTATE OF \$150,746**

One-Third Goes To Widow, Two-Thirds To the Three Children.

The late David J. Cowan, a former rell-known hardware merchant of this ity who died recently, left an estate valued at \$150,756.86, according to the will filed in the surrogate court. The um is to be invested for the benefit of the deceased's widow, Mrs. Emily C. Cowan, and for the maintenance and education of the children until he youngest attains the age of 21 years.

The estate, which is in trust, will not be distributed until Isabel, the youngest child, attains the age of 21 years. One-third will then go to Mrs. Cowan and the remainder to the three children, Isabel, Kathaleen and James Alfred. The last-named will receive \$5,000 when he attains the age of 25 years, and a similar sum when he is 30 years old. He will receive \$600 per year in quarterly installments until he is 25.
