Rev. Mr. Ball stated that difficulties were already noted in the United States that might mean the exclusion of three branches of the colored church, totalling a membership over 300,000 people. "Race prejudice is a spreading cancer," said Mr. Ball, "and is found everywhere."

"The policy best to their good would be to discuss a union of own, and later, when the right time presented itself, be ready to join in a general and universal church

Rev. Mr. Ball is a former Londoner, and was for some time pastor of the church in which he spoke Friday.

Ball stated that no duty could be more pleasant than the one before him.
