

TRAVELERS' AID HELPS 719 PEOPLE IN MONTH

Reports of Various Y.W.C.A. Committees Show Marked Progress.

Favorable reports were given at the regular meeting of the Y. W. C. A. board held yesterday afternoon at "Lenmore." The Travelers' Aid secretary stated that 719 persons had been assisted in various ways at the stations during the past month. Her report also showed that a list of boarding houses was being prepared, which contains the names and addresses of houses visited and found suitable.

Mrs. Gordon Philip, convener of the physical department, reported that the members were busy making wig costumes and scenery for the physical exhibition being held May 4th. The Nightingale Club is presenting a play April 26th in the collegiate auditorium, the title of which is "When the Sun Turned," and the Pollyannas are planning to present one early in May. The proceeds of these plays will be expended in sending delegates to the provincial study conference arranged by the National Council and the balance left will be devoted to the girls' camp at Port Bruce.

A report of the Woolcraft Class which is held every Monday evening under the direction of Mrs. Crouch, was given.

Congratulations were extended to the 16 girls who were successful in obtaining 70 per cent and over in the examinations of the St. John Ambulance Corps. This course was conducted by Dr. R. Gordon, and Dr. E. F. Keller acted as examiner. The certificates will be presented Friday evening following a supper, at which H. E. Beal, principal of the Technical School, Mrs. Donald McLean, president of the Y board, and Mrs. John Dennis, convener of the committee, will be guests of honor, along with Dr. Keller and Dr. Gordon. The home nursing examinations will be tried following the presentations.

It was also announced that Miss Bertha Hamilton, industrial fish secretary of the Y. W. C. A., will be a visitor in the city April 27, and following a reception given in her honor will address the older classes on "City Fish Ship." Mrs. John Rose also will speak at this gathering.
