Vancouver, Sept. 5.—(Special)—Though there were just thirteen races on the card, and exactly three times thirteen contestants, the 1896 championship meet passed into history this afternoon as unqualifiedly the best yet.

The championship races were unplaced and slow in consequence of the half being taken in 1:10; the mile in 2:39.2-5; and the five in 14:39. Spain was forced to content himself with second honors in the half, and was beaten in for even this position by Wolff in the mile.
