Buffalo, N. Y., Sept. 16.—Leon F. Czolgosz, alias Fred. Nieman, was inlicted this afternoon by the County court grand jury for the crime of murder in the first degree in fatally shooting President William McKinley at the Temple of Music, in the Pan-American Exposition grounds at 4:15 o'clock

on the afternoon of September 6.
When arraigned before Judge Edward
K. Emery in the County court, the
prisoner stubbornly refused to answer questions repeatedly asked of him by District Attorney Penney as to whether he had counsel or wanted counsel. The district attorney then suggested that inasmuch as the defendant refused to answer, counsel should be arraigned. Judge Emery assigned Hon. Loran L. Lewis and Hon. Robert C. Titus, former Supreme court justices of this city, whose names had been suggested by the Eric County Bar Association. Ozologoz will probably be arraigned again tomorrow morning to plead to the indictment. District Attorney Penney presented the evidence in the murder case to the grand jury from 10 o'clock in the morning until a few minutes past 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Aside from the surgeons and physicians in the case, no witnesses were sworn other than those who were in the Temple of Music and witnessed the shooting. At 4:15 this afternoon, just exactly 10 days after the shooting, the Grand Jury voted unanimously to indict Czolgosz for murder in the first degree. At 4:45 o'clock the secret indictment was presented to Judge Emery in the County court. Then ensued a wait for an hour, but the rumor that the murderer was to be arraigned spread and in a short time the court room was crowded. 
